ROAD REHAB

Council has awarded a \$1.55 million contract for road rehabilitation on three high-use roads to local company Fulton Hogan. Four sections of road will be reconstructed - two on Thompsons Track, one on Fairfield Road and one on Seafield Road. **Group Manager of Infrastructure** Neil McCann said Fulton Hogan will head to Thompsons Track first, with the aim of getting two sections completed before Christmas. The Fairfield and Seafield Road sites will be completed in the new year. Contractors are making steady progress on repairs to Fords Road, Trevors Road and Pole Road.

PUSH ON POKIES

There's just a few days left to give feedback on our Draft Gambling Venue Policy and Draft Dangerous, Affected and Insanitary Buildings Policy. The gambling venue policy is proposing a cap on the number of gambling venues allowed in the district, and the buildings policy is being updated to meet new Building Act requirements. We're training to be match fit too

It was great to head to Mayor School in Wellington this week with an extra spring in my step, after Mid Canterbury won rugby's prestigious Meads Cup at the weekend.

The Hammers' win over Thames Valley is good for local rugby, and for the district as a whole, and I was proud to be part of such a big crowd at the showgrounds united in cheering them on.

There was not the same fanfare at Mayor School, but I came away feeling I was part of another team, also facing some big challenges – like keeping rates affordable for our communities while delivering the services they want.

Mayor's Induction is run by Local Government New Zealand and is affectionately referred to as Mayor School. New mayors like me, and returning mayors from all around New Zealand get together after the local elections for a two-day conference.

It is a chance to meet other mayors, form connections and prepare for the new triennium.

Mayors work closely with their CEs and fellow councillors, but peer support is important too.

All the topics were aimed at helping us nail the role of mayor, from politics to governance, and from funding to building a new team.

Our new Ashburton council team spent time last week getting to know each other and our first induction session was all about what council does, why we do it and how we do it. This week there'll be another induction session, focusing on governance and decision-making, and things like meeting procedure. We'll also be talking about the relationships we have with other agencies and groups, like iwi and Local Government NZ.

Our four new councillors will be attending a session for newly-elected councillors in Christchurch on Friday.

The inaugural council meeting will be held next Wednesday on 29 October and all elected members, including the Methven Community Board, will be officially sworn into office.

The first real business meeting of council will be on 5 November and we'll all be ready to pack down a good scrum.

LABOUR DAY WEEKEND RUBBISH & RECYCLING

Kerbside Collection

There is no change to kerbside rubbish and recycling collections on Labour Day, 27 October, and Monday's collection will take place as usual, with residents to have their wheelie bins out by 7.30am.

Resource Recovery Parks

The Ashburton Resource Recovery Park will be open Saturday from 9am-6pm, Sunday from 9am-5pm, and Monday from 9am until 5pm.

The Methven green waste dropoff will be open Sunday from 12pm until 4pm. The Rakaia Resource Recovery Park will be open on Saturday from 9am-3pm, but closed on Monday.

Trial pile will test Chalmers Ave ground

Contractors working for NZ **Transport Agency Waka Kotahi** plan to drill a trial pile at the end of Chalmers Avenue, as part of preliminary work for the second **Ashburton Bridge.**

From Wednesday this week, the work area near Robilliard Park was to be fenced off and a gravel pad laid for the crane and piling rig.

Access to the Mania-O-Roto scout park and the Collegiate Squash Club remains, and people will still be able to access the river track.

Council's Group Manager of Infrastructure Neil McCann said the actual piling work was planned for the week from 3 November.

"The hammering part will be loud at times but the noise won't be constant as there will be pauses for welding and equipment changes. Residents who live closest to the site have been informed by letterdrop and we've also met with the scouts and the squash club so they know what's happening.

"Council will also have a contractor working in the southern part of Chalmers Avenue for the next month installing new water pipes, so there's a lot going on and temporary traffic management in place. The new water pipes will eventually take water over the new bridge too."



The piling work involves driving a large steel pipe (1500mm in diameter) about 20 metres into the ground, using a crane-mounted hammer. After the pipe is installed, the material inside it will be drilled out and a concrete plug inserted; the plug will be hammered down inside the pipe to test ground strength.

Mr McCann said the trial pile was the closest piling work to residents in the entire project.

"The trial pile will help the bridge builders understand how the ground behaves so the right piles can be designed to safely support the new bridge."

Three pine trees on the Robilliard Park side of the avenue will also be removed, and the wood donated to the scouts.

ROADING NOTICES

DIA accepts inhouse unit for water services

Council's water services delivery plan for an in-house business unit to deliver water services for the district has been accepted by the Department of Internal Affairs.

The delivery plan was required by law as part of reforms to drinking water, wastewater and stormwater services for all councils.

Chief Executive Hamish Riach said he was pleased to hear from the Secretary for Local Government Paul James this week that Ashburton's delivery plan had been assessed and accepted.

"This plan is no small document and sets out in detail how Council intends to provide water services for its communities,

while meeting new national water quality and Commerce Commission requirements. There was overwhelming support from the community for an inhouse business unit when we consulted about how water should be delivered in the future, and we're pleased that the community's preferred position has been accepted by the DIA.

"Work now turns to implementing the plan, which will be operational by July

Developing the plan, Council had to assess its water infrastructure and how much it needed to invest in improvements, and how it planned to finance and deliver water services.
