From the Foothills to the World Stage: Bede Giera's Journey to the World U19 Rowing Championships

Former Mt Somers Springburn School student, Bede Giera (2012–2019), has been selected to represent New Zealand in the U19 Men's Eight at the 2025 World Rowing U19 Championships, held this August in Trakai, Lithuania.

Bede's path to the world stage has been anything but straightforward. In 2024, he made the difficult decision to turn down a New Zealand Junior Rowing trial. For Bede the choice to captain St Bede's College's 1st XV rugby team in his final year of school was a matter of loyalty and unfinished business.

"It was a tough call to turn down the trial last year," Bede reflects, "but I really wanted to play another season of 1st XV rugby in my final year of school."

That leap of faith paid off. Despite a season of mixed results, Bede was selected for the New Zealand Secondary Schools rugby team, competing against Samoa, Australia, and the NZ Māori U18 sides. He also received an offer to join the Crusaders Academy.

Following three years of rowing at St Bede's College under coach Dale Maher—highlighted by a Maadi Cup win in 2023—Bede continued his development at Avon Rowing Club in Christchurch. There, he and his crewmates achieved success at the 2025 New Zealand Rowing Championships, winning gold in both the Men's Club Four (setting a national record time of 6:19) and the Club Pair.

Bede's father rowed in St Bede's College's 1991 Maadi Cup crew, and his grandfather, Murray Giera, had a long association with the sport as a coach and was part of the legendary 1964 Head of the River-

winning Eight. His siblings, Ruby and Isaac—also former students of Mt Somers Springburn School—have competed in rowing at the secondary school level.

Following the 2025 Maadi Cup, the country's top junior rowers gathered at Lake Karapiro for the U19 national trials. Team selection didn't come easily. Over the course of a week, the athletes underwent seat racing, a process in which rowers are rotated between boats to determine the strongest combinations, as well as time trials. At the end of the week, Bede secured his place in the Rowing New Zealand U19 Men's Eight.

The campaign is divided into three key phases: training in Christchurch with individual rowing clubs; six weeks of team-based training at Lake Karapiro, where Bede is currently based with the squad; and finally, travel to Lithuania for five days of competition from August 6 to 10. Representing New Zealand on the world stage is a rare achievement and comes with a significant cost. The \$20,000 campaign is entirely self-funded, with the campaign cost doubling in 2025 due to a reprioritisation of funding from High Performance Sport New Zealand.

"It's a big challenge to take on fundraising for the World Champs but it is important to my longer-term goals in sport and my plans for university education."

To support his goal, Bede has been working six hours a day on a 500-cow dairy farm, running community fundraising initiatives, including selling wine and garden soil, while training 11 to 12 times per week. He has also been reaching out to family, friends, and local businesses for fundraising opportunities and sponsorship.

"It's been incredible actually the amount of support I have had to be here, everyone's been really generous and there are so many people I could thank. I am extremely grateful, and I hope to be able to pay it back on the world stage."

The funds will be used across all stages of the campaign to cover essential costs, including accommodation, meals, transport, and training expenses during the training camp and travel to Lithuania. Bede and his Avon crewmates Luke Tompkins, Payo O'Sullivan and Ben Allan join Corben Campbell, Jack Buckley, Blake Cooper, George Marshall and coxswain Eliza

Fleur Sullivan's wonderful soup recipes! Sounds good and it would have been had I been more careful and followed the recipe more carefully. Fleur Sullivan was the brains behind the legendary restaurant Fleurs Place at Moeraki. The restaurant unfortunately is now closed, fortunately the Christchurch Press saw fit to publish two of her soup recipes labeled Keep Warm this Winter soups. Certainly, they keep you warm as you bend over a hot stove preparing these easy to prepare winter soups.

The recipe for carrot soup looked to me to be quite straight forward.

1kg carrots, skin on

1 onion, finely diced

2 cloves garlic, chopped

Olive oil or butter

1 litre vegetable stock

½ cup - crunchy peanut butter

handful of basil leaves chopped

2 tbsp chilli sauce plus extra to taste

400 ml can coconut cream

This all appeared quite straight forward as I headed to the supermarket to buy the necessary ingredients.

I thought I had done well, it all looked so easy!

The result was what I describe as a moderate success. I prepared these ingredients and cooked as instructed, the carrots roasted in the oven for approx. an hour and a half the onion and garlic cooked in oil until clear, the coconut cream stirred in finally before serving. coconut cream I found to be a very likable product I may use it more. I mixed it well with the stick blender, then sampled this delightful product! Flavour very good but this mixture was almost not edible! Why, it was full of stringy sort of stuff, the flavour good when more coconut cream was added, but it was full of a mass of stringy almost spiky nonedible matter.

Back to the drawing board just what was wrong, Fleur would hardly have served up soup like that. It took a moment to find the fault, what I had bought at the supermarket was not basil but bay leaves, dry bay leaves at that. I note for some recipes using bay leaves they are tied together and then removed after the cooking process is complete, I certainly



Biography Service – **Hospice Mid Canterbury**

Everyone has a story to tell

There are 8 biographers in the Hospice Mid Canterbury (HMC) volunteer team and over the course of 10 years, they have written almost 150 biographies of local people who have become clients of

Who can get their biography written?

Anyone who has received a terminal diagnosis can become a client of Hospice Mid Canterbury, and biographies - peoples' life stories - are one of the many free services on offer.

Who are the biographers?


The biographers, all living in Mid Canterbury, come from a wide variety of backgrounds and undertake training before they begin their work. Clients are carefully matched with biographers to make it a successful and enjoyable experience.

I've agreed to get my life story down.

What happens now?

A biographer will arrange to visit at a suitable time for the client. Usually a session takes 45 minutes to an hour, depending on how well the client is feeling. This takes the form of an informal chat with the biographer, recorded on a phone, where the client recalls stories and events from the past. While dates and events are important, it is the stories that bring the biography to life.

The biographer then goes home and types up the notes from the recording, and returns the following week to present the stories from the previous session and then work on the next part of the biography. Photos are a key part of the process and these can be added once the stories have been recorded.



won't mix up bay into a product again, a lesson learnt and I'll buy the right product when shopping – pay attention to detail in future.

I sieved this mixture through a calinda and now have what is left in an almost edible state. I had a good serving for lunch with the very necessary coconut cream. The winning point, I have learnt something, perhaps I'm a little wiser, We learn by trying or are we just trying – nothing was ever discovered without attempting the unknown. My carrot soup was almost a failure, so what, the next attempt is sure to succeed, it will be pumpkin soup next week.

U3A Lifelong Learning: is a monthly lecture lasting about one hour from 10.00am, this happens in Ashburton on the 3rd Tuesday of each month (usually). This month the lecture came from a person by the name of Mark Webster a pharmacist with many letters after his name, Mark's topic was: Integrative Medicine to stay Well. He founded a stay well clinic in Christchurch to be a place that focused on 'curing or preventing' disease, instead of just managing.

This was a well presented and illustrated lecture, and there tended to be some perhaps slight criticism of the medical profession. I guess there is room for some criticism, should your doctor or specialist have prescribed 'Atorvastatin' tablets this man was quick to recommend that you cease to take such medication. No doubt he is correct, a lot of medication may have undesirable side effects. I have been subscribed these statin tablets for many years as I guess many others have also. They are, if required, a very important and worthwhile medication. In short statins can lower bad cholesterol and increase good cholesterol, further to that they may prevent heart attacks and strokes by keeping your arteries clear. I will continue as recommended by my specialist and doctor have one 40ml tablet per day, originally one 80ml per day, side effects so far, appear to be nil.

Book of the Month – Mt Somers Library

Title: 'The Last Secret Agent:

The untold story of my life as a spy behind Nazi enemy lines'

Author: Pippa Latour with Jude Dobson

Publication year: 2024 A review by Elles Smallegoor

When Pippa Latour's son was reading online about intelligence work during World War II and spotted his mother's quite unique offical name Phyllis Latour, he wondered whether there was more to her story of having been a balloon operator for the Women's Auxiliary Air Force. There certainly was. She reluctantly confessed to him and his brother that she had actually been a Special Operations Executive (SOE) for Winston Churchill in the 1940s. Having signed an official oath, being a private person and strongly wishing never to go back mentally to "that hellish existence" of living and working in a time of war (p. 21), Pippa had never told anyone about her SOE assignment. After the war, she started a new life in New Zealand and wanted to look forward, not back. Now the truth was out, however. And she listened with indignation to some of the nonsense, or, in her words, "poppycock" (p. 14), that was written about her, her family and former war colleagues on the internet. Encouraged by others and realising, being a 101, that she was "the last living female operative of the F (France) section" (p. 22), she agreed to share her wartime experiences with author Jude Dobson, who helped her write down her extraordinary story. Written in the firstperson, "The Last Secret Agent" is a truthful, informative and unsentimental memoir about Pippa's first 25 years of life. The book is a pageturner pur sang; it was impossible for me to put it down.

The book's first chapters deal with Pippa's "unusual childhood in Africa" (p. 26), the series of losses that she had to deal with (one of them being orphaned as a fouryear-old), the "mix of nationalities and cultures" (p. 35) that she was exposed to and the multiple skills that she learned along the way. As she looks back on her younger years, in which she learned to fly a plane, hunt animals and communicate in Morse code, amongst others, Pippa concedes how her early life seemed to follow a certain trajectory that offered her "the perfect training for my SOE" (p. 46). The following chapters reveal how Pippa ended up working for the Admiralty in Scotland during the early war years, and, having lost loved ones as a direct result of the German occupation in France, decided to actively join the war effort, which led to her being recruited to

become one of Churchill's secret spies: "I had morals that I lived by, and would even die by, to secure a freedom I desperately wanted to protect" (p. 87).

The remainder of the book is a detailed personal account of Pippa's work on the ground behind enemy lines in the northwest of France, where she, as a 20-something-year-old, had to pretend to be a French teenager selling soap on a bike traversing the entire region, while in the meantime actually being a wireless operator for the British government. In collaboration with colleagues and French resistance fighters, she had to locate several hidden radios which she then used regularly to inform her superiors of German army locations, provide general intelligence and help sabotage the work of the Nazis. Every day, she could be discovered, arrested and tortured, raped or killed. Or make a mistake that would lead to the arrest or death of others. A hellish existence indeed.

Jude Dobson does an excellent job in giving Pippa her (emphatically female) voice, and revealing her unbelievable courage, intelligence and moral compass. She also cleverly weaves relevant background information about the war into the narrative and, as she herself indicates, adds dialogue "in the interest of the story" (p. 13). The memoir sucks the reader back in time and brings home in vivid detail what it was like to operate as a secret agent in the twentieth century, when internet, cell phones and drones were still a lifetime away. It also leaves the reader with a renewed sense of awe for people such as Pippa, who endured and sacrificed so much to ensure the surrender of a brutal regime. A truly awesome read.




