In addition to the ongoing delivery of our current programmes, Safer Mid Canterbury received additional funding to enhance some of our current programmes and to deliver new programmes.

Whilst we already held a contract to provide Refugee Settlement Services, we had only received a small amount of funding to develop the service and had not started delivery due to COVID 19. From 1 July 2021 full funding was provided as per the original agreement due to the arrival of refugee families. We had previously only had one staff member developing the service however once full funding was received it allowed us to employ our full team of five staff for that service. Our Attendance Service, which has traditionally been poorly funding, saw funding doubled which allowed us to double staffing for this service. This was due to COVID 19 to allow us to provide a better response to families supporting them to re-engage children into education after lockdowns. A third area where we saw a substantial increase in income was within our Restorative Justice Service. We have been delivering this service within the Ashburton District Court for the last 22 years how we recently picked up the contracts to deliver the service in both the Timaru and Oamaru Courts.

Two new programmes were launched in 2021, firstly the Community Connector Service. This service was established to support individuals and families that had been affected by COVID 19 in any shape or form however it did have a focus on supporting those who had lost employment or seen their hours reduce. There have been recent changes to this service where we have seen a doubling in contract income and a new shifted focus to supporting all people in the community who are required to self-isolate. The second new project was the Refugee Health Navigation Service, we received funding to employ two staff, a male and a female, to provide health support to refugees, staff in this service are required to be Bi-lingual. We have employed one male worker and are still in the process of trying to employ a bi-lingual female staff member.
