### Methven Strategic Plan stocktake 2014

The first Methven Community Strategic Plan was developed in 1997 by the Methven community in a process facilitated by Ashburton District Council. The plan was the catalyst for much change in Methven and was, by any standards, been a resounding success. It provided the Methven community, Ashburton District Council and other key stakeholders with a structure and focus for developing Methven in the ways the community identified from the outset of the plan.

The subsequent 2009 Methven Community Strategic Plan built on the previous plans success. It was developed through two community workshops, a focus group discussion and a number of meetings between Ashburton District Council and the Methven Community Board. It was then open to public submissions and as a result, some changes were made.

The 2009 plan moved away from focusing on what the Council can do for the Methven community and more towards what the community can do for Methven, often with Council's support. The strategy is about Methven deciding for itself what it wants to be and finding ways to achieve this.

In 2011 a review was undertaken and further actions were included. These are included in the stocktake in the green sections.

The 2009 Methven Community Strategic Plan is a 10 year plan and this stocktake is at the halfway mark. Many of the actions from the 2009 plan have been achieved – and this is an opportunity to celebrate these successes, focus attention on the outstanding actions and add any further priorities. The aim is to produce an updated set of actions to continue to develop Methven as a great place to live and visit.

To do this, community consultation was required to ensure an accurate reflection of the needs and wants of the Methven community is captured. Members of the Methven community attended a fun day on 8 February hosted by the Methven Community Board where they could help contribute to the stocktake. People were able to provide additions to the plan for the board to consider in an interactive post it board. This along with the bouncy castle proved a hit with the younger participants.

Other community organisations also attended including Methven House and Neighbourhood Support, who had a map of Methven streets where the organisation was present. The day culminated with the unveiling of the Raj the Dog sculpture by artist David Marshall and a shared afternoon tea.

The Methven Community Board considered the communities input at their meeting 9 March.

No stocktake was undertaken of the telecommunication options available in the community.

The Councils annual residents survey included a question 2008 on internet provision. 88 out of the 103 people surveyed had internet in their home (97%). Of these, 67% were broadband connections and the remainder was dial up connections. The question was subsequently removed from the survey. However the 2013 Census shows 79.1% of Methven residents have access to the internet.

The installation of the free WIFI hotspots in old phone boxes has increased options for internet users. The Methven township has four phone boxes resulting in much of the inner town being able to access this service.

Fibre optic cables have been installed in the district and free access is provided to Methven Primary School and Mount Hutt College. Members of the public can also access the cable on a user pays basis.
