### Dick Hansen – the friend that Mount Somers didn't really know it had.

When we began planning the construction of the Information Station on the Village Green we faced the challenge of how we could best turn the architect's vision into reality, given that we had modest funds at our disposal

The building itself – although it looks deceptively simple, had a number of challenges. It was not a straight forward task – the builder had to organise a collection of unskilled volunteers, recycled roof trusses from the Christchurch Earthquake, donated timber, flooring materials and coordinate with local contractors and District Council as well

One name came to mind immediately – Dick Hansen, a retired builder from Ashburton who had some connections to Mount Somers already, having built or renovated a number of buildings in the area over the years. He was a regular visitor to the Mount Somers Rugby grounds firstly as a player for Allenton and later as a coach

In my last year playing rugby for Mount Somers I played against Dick and his Allenton team three times. We were evenly matched – so much so, that the two teams shared the Senior Reserve Trophy that year.

Dick agreed to help us with our project. He said that he always felt really at home in the district and was excited by the concept and plans

He put together a budget for us to accompany our fundraising applications. When these were successful we were finally able to make a start.

As the build came to an end, we had received no accounts for all Dick's time and travel. When we enquired, we were told he had no intentions of charging us, he was just happy to do it.

To go some way to thank him we were planning to give Dick and his wife Lorraine, a very special weekend in the district – including flights over the mountains with Philip Todhunter at Lake Heron Air, 4WD trips in the hills, a night in the new hut at Inverary, and a celebration dinner at Stroneschrubie.

Sadly this was never able to happen. As the build and subsequent interior fit out came to an end in late August and early September, Dick told us he had been received an advanced cancer diagnosis and

the future was bleak. Despite this he carried on and finished the project. About six weeks later in mid October Dick passed away The Information Station was designed as a celebration of Mount Somers history and it will service that purpose magnificently. At the same time, we can see the building as a beautifully constructed reminder of a highly skilled craftsman with a wonderful community ethic and an enormously generous personality that he did his best to conceal.

There should not be any cobwebs left in Mt Somers!

I have never known such a relentless wind that is just going on and on. Most unpleasant for humans and stock alike. Please could we have some peaceful days and just get on with springlike weeks to let the spring gardens do their thing.

Thankfully the winds do not stop us reading, just as well as new books keep coming:

'The Irish Goodbye' by Heather Aimee O'Neill. I quote "A finely crafted novel exploring what it means to be a family and what we owe ourselves and each other." Three adult sisters meet up at their childhood home on Long Island for Thanksgiving weekend and each of them carries a heavy secret. Old tensions boil over and new truths emerge, a very real portrait of what can happen when families aren't on their best behaviour. I'm partway through reading this book and look forward to my reading times with it. Each chapter is in the voice of one of the sisters so easy to keep track of the story. This will be on the shelves in November as will all of the following.

**'The Last Living Cannibal' by Ariana Ngarewa.** This is the third book by this author ('The Bone Tree'.....'Patea Boys')

He was born and raised in Taranaki and is a schoolteacher of Ngati Ruanui, , Nga Rauru, Ngaruahine descent.

Some background.....Set in the 1940s and the Maori men of Taranaki will not join the Maori battalion because they had already lost too much. In 1865 the Crown confiscated 1.2 million acres in Taranaki, taking land from Maori both loyal to the Crown and those deemed rebels. Although the Crown justified the confiscation as punishment for insurrection, Maori regarded these seizures as land theft disguised as colonial law.

This book centres on Koko, the oldest man in the village and a legend who has lived through the land wars and then imprisonment in Dunedin. There is a whisper of him as the Last Living Cannibal. This book looks very interesting and topical

#### 'Buckeye' by Patrick Ryan.

I have heard such good things about this book. Simply put, it is an emotional roller coaster of two couples told over four decades in small town America.

I overheard a bookseller recommending it to a customer, and couldn't resist buying it for the library. It is already in circulation so should be available sometime this month.

We have made Joyce Grieve's scrapbooks of yesteryear more accessible, now next to the couch. These are such a valuable resource of the Mt Somers area, all meticulously cut out and glued into time zones. Unfortunately they cannot be removed from the library, but provide hours of reading for those who want to sit a while on the couch or in the sun.

#### Some interesting facts about the Mt Somer's Library:

It was originally founded in 1883 in a room in the first Accommodation House of A Peache and J Hood on the Ashburton Gorge Road. In 1921 the old school became the first library building.

in 1921 the old school became the first horary building.

It was demolished with the old school in 1965, and then became kept in cupboards in the local Memorial Hall.

In March 2012, the old Post Office next to the General Store became its new home.

And there is resides, very comfortably in the midst of Mt Somers, lending approximately 1500 books annually and providing the township (and others) a constant supply of free books on 'the outside shelves'.



#### A COMMENT

I now settle down in front of the computer to write yet another 'A Comment'. I have little idea as to how many A Comments I have written, and I guess it really does not matter, since writing my first comment I have seldom missed an issue although I must have failed to write for the occasional issue. I did write before Jeremy became the editor, and I must comment on what a great job he has done over many years of editing the "Nor wester" and getting it out to the folk of the Foothills. It has been a great link that helps so much to bind the people together and serves the community well. A much-needed publication.

Only two days ago I return from a time away, something I appear to do about twice a year. I'm very happy at my home with my cat Nick and dog Leo. Leo has got to be quite well known in the neighbourhood. Some of the school children call out hello Leo as they pass by on their bikes or more commonly scooters. Leo had his six-monthly hair cut or groom as they call it, he had got to be very hairy, I'm able to trim him to some degree but when it comes to his legs and more particularly the paws I'm certainly not allowed. So, to the vet where he gets sedated and very professionally groomed, I won't mention the price! He no longer carries twigs and sticky weed into the house, also when he chooses to swim in the stream, he certainly dries much better, but his hair will grow, and I guess in six months he will have to return to the vet clinic once more.

My time was spent traveling and in Nelson where time was well spent visiting my aging sister, a cousin and the widow of a cousin. It was a change, and I enjoy the area, so very different to Ashburton and surrounds.

On my return home I spent a night at my old hometown of Murchison, it is different but only a little different, the streets are the same, no change of names there, there is a new supermarket although it looks a little like a cowshed a low building with a flat roof, I thought it lacked imagination, it is a nice shiny new building a big step up on the previous Four Square. There is to be a 150-year celebration at Easter next year, I thought I should attend, three days of it if you please. I learnt at the museum that I had to go to the school office to register. The school is very much the same as when I attended in the late 1940s finally leaving rather abruptly in 1956. I had just finished what was known as form 2 and I had turned 15 years of age. There was little point in me returning to school in the new year, I was not a student and never had been, I remember finding the High School head a Mr. Preston. I classed him as a good teacher, he politely said they would miss me! I wondered why! I was born left-handed I was instructed to write with my right hand, I must have obeyed that instruction, as at no time did I get hit over the knuckles for using the wrong hand. But to get back to Mr. Preston (nick named old Press-to). This wise teacher I remember him suggesting that I may be better writing with my left hand, the only teacher with such a suggestion. My mother was very opposed to left-handed writers making comments about such folk and stating that they look very awkward! In her view every person should write with their right hand. Times have changed I now have one son left-handed and two grandchildren likewise and I believe the rest of the world is not concerned these days.

I left Murchison for Arthurs Pass, the Lewis had closed the day before with a bad wash-out, I traveled almost in a convey of vehicles to Reefton where for me it was time for a rest stop, there I had coffee and some nourishment at the Reefton Bakery and scored a long conversation with a Mr. Tony Fortune, a man I had not previously met. We found plenty to talk about, a JP who had been to Ashburton recently to a JP conference. After discussing Murchison and the West Coast in general.

Having left the Buller Gorge I had escaped a bright yellow Ford Mustang with a black top, a convertible. This car followed me at close quarters in due course I pulled over and let him pass, then I found myself close behind him. H was what I would call an erratic driver, accelerating fast and braking hard he turned left at Inangahua Junction as did I enroute to Reefton. On the first straight he overtook other cars in grand style, I thought good I will not see you again, then as I approached Reefton, I met him traveling at high speed coming toward me, I guess he had taken the wrong turn and found Reefton instead of Westport!

I had a very pleasant drive over Arthurs Pass although a long wait at roadworks toward Otira.

The journey home was uneventful and soon after my return my friend Liz arrived with Leo who was exceedingly excited to find me at home as was Nick the cat.



Rural Women continue to advocate for rural services, school buses, postal services and health care.



# Five ways to talk to a child about death

When you lose a family member or close friend, one of the most challenging aspects is to explain this to a child. At a time when adults are living with their own grief, children dealing with the loss of a loved one may be experiencing unfamiliar emotions and looking to adults they love to try to learn how to respond to them.

Here are a few tips for talking about death with children:

- 1. Be calm, honest and straight forward. Use simple words like died, death, cancer. Euphemisms can confuse children.
- 2. Encourage children to talk about it and how they feel. Check their level of understanding and repeat key information as needed.



- 3. Invite questions. Listen then answer, based on their age and stage. Bite sized pieces of information work best.
- 4. Reassure them that they are safe and it's not their fault. Help them identify people they know who are supporting them and will continue to support them.
- 5. Involve them in family events such as gatherings or memorial services. Encourage their contribution, however small.

Book of the Month – Mt Somers Library Title: 'The Butterfly Man' Author: Heather Rose

Publication year: 2005 (this Allen & Unwin edition 2025)

A new edition of Australian author Heather Rose's 2005 novel 'The Butterfly Man' has arrived in the library. It is a sensitive and subtle imaginative work that grew out of a handful of historical facts, the London murder of Sandra Rivett on 7 November 1974 and the disappearance of the Earl of Lucan, also known as Richard John Bingham, a day later, being the two most prominent ones. In the novel Bingham finds himself accused of violently murdering Rivett and flees the country. With the help of some influential individuals he takes on a new identity on the African continent and reinvents himself as the ordinary and slightly rough loner and builder Henry Kennedy. A few years later, he emigrates to Tasmania where he starts a new life.


It is here the reader first meets him. The book opens in the late 1990s and Henry is bed-ridden because of a developing brain tumour. His Vietnamese partner Lili, her recently returned daughter Suki and her grandson Charlie all live under his roof. His ability to speak is affected and his thinking confused. He has just had a stroke:

"I wake to find a young woman sitting beside me. She is Asian. Japanese. Chinese. I don't know. 'Hello, Henry,' she says, smiling and taking my hand. I try to take it back but it doesn't respond. 'It's Suki, Henry.' She has on a red shirt. She has earrings too. Large Indian earrings that move and sparkle. 'I'm sorry, young lady, but I am not Henry.'" (p. 1).

With the unravelling of Henry's mind and strict control over his life, his old identity as the Earl of Lucan clearly begins to re-emerge. A first chapter can often be a clue to a novel's themes. One of the novel's main occupations is to examine how the past can catch up with people, and the first few pages clearly hint at this. As the story progresses, Lili, Suki, and, to a lesser extent, Charlie, will turn out to have some secrets of their own too.

Rose begins her narrative with mystery and suspense; in the first few chapters, the reader still has no knowledge of Henry's – and the others' – chequered past and must wait patiently for their entire stories to be told. In the mean time, while she uses this suspense to compel the reader to keep reading, she

creates an intimate picture of a household of humans who live in a small, beautiful Tasmanian mountain community, and who love each other but who also struggle with their own demons while trying to lead a normal working and family life. She introduces Henry's best friend Jimmy, who has not only his own past to deal with but also that of his Aboriginal and Viking (!) ancestors. There is Henry's business partner Stan, who is in a wheelchair but has managed to become a successful architect . Most characters in the novel have reinvented themselves after trauma. Most have done so in a new place. Rose has a great ability to create understanding and compassion for the ways in which they strive to make a new home and identity for



themselves, however fraught their relationships sometimes are. She also reveals that the ability of the mind and body to store memory makes any reinvention process highly complicated.

While inspired by real-life events, "The Butterfly Man" is more philosophical than historical. The novel deals with the big themes of life, death, the passing of time, race, nature/nurture, memory and human imperfection. It does so seriously, but throughout the book Rose makes sure there is light-hearted humour as well. Moreover, while it certainly is a contemporary realist novel in many ways, it also leaves room for mystery and magic. We never get to know the full truth about the characters in the novel and there is, especially towards the end, an otherworldly spirit to the book that comforts and heals. If you are looking for a beautiful read in the next few months, this should certainly be on your list.
