9.1 ADC Open Spaces (Ian Soper/Bert Hofmans)

Lake Camp/Clearwater

Another round of weed spraying was conducted January 2022 around Lake Camp and areas near the Lake Clearwater Settlement. Broom, gorse, rosehip, lupins and rowans were targeted. The contractor noted a large number of rowan seedlings (27) along the eastern margins of Lake Camp.

Ashton Beach

A skink survey was conducted November 2021 by Marieke Lettink of Fauna Finders at Ashton Beach. The purpose of the survey is to assist Council in determining what measures will be required if it is to be successful with its wildlife permit application. This will be the subject of a report to Council in the very near future.

9.2 Ashburton Water Zone Committee (Angela Cushnie)

The Mid Canterbury Catchment Collective was formed in December 2021, updates once the strategy and action plan have been finalised. Chairman Duncan Barr and Catchment Coordinator Angela Cushnie are the contact people.

Eiffelton Biodiversity Collective

Planted 1,000 carex secta and 500 flax as riparian planting with plans to add more every year.

Ashburton Water Zone Committee

2021-2024 Action Plan incorporates mahinga kai, ecosystem health and biodiversity targets by working alongside landowners, Rununga, communities, councils and others.

Rat trap boxes have been placed around the Awa Awa Rata Reserve and are being checked regularly - so far numerous rats, mice and stoats have been caught. Another committee member has placed stoat and possum traps around the reserve. Wasp bait was put out this week around the reserve and along the DOC tracks above the picnic area.

Edith Smith's update

Lupins appear to be on the increase in the dryland area between the Ashburton River below Buicks Bridge and Paddle Stream. Forest and Bird have an arrangement with DOC to spray them in the area near the old rubbish dump. This season over 800 Russell Lupin have been dealt with in three visits. A volunteer has checked for lupins from our work area to Blowing Point Bridge to ascertain the spread and whether the lupin is beyond our control. This will be reported to DOC and ECan.

This dryland area is a significant remnant of old riverbed vegetation and important to keep weed free. Our concern is not only the lupin but the rapid increase in willows along the river edge but also among the wetter areas in the vicinity. Ecan and LINZ have a role in controlling these.

Two wilding tree days over the area from Paddle Stream gate fence line to the Hakatere Heron road resulted in reassuring few random wilding pine numbers along with rowan and elderberry and no broom in the wider area. Unfortunately adjoining Hakatere Station over 900 pinus wildings and 60 broom plants. This work is part of Forest and Bird's agreement with DOC and has been carried out for over 10 years. There are discussions among wilding management experts about the removal of the wilding seed sources including shelterbelts.

There are still Pinus contorta growing at Lake Camp which should be dealt with. It is hoped ADC will continue to clear the area of these and other seed producing wilding trees in their proposed management plan.

Trustees of the Harris Scientific Reserve met with Open Spaces Manager Ian Soper to discuss the future of the Reserve with a proposal that ADC take over management. It was recommended that this would need to be included in the Long Term Plan if changes were to be considered. The Reserve has become a resource for locally sourced Canterbury Plains native vegetation for seed collection and recent visitors were very impressed by the variety of species from known local sources growing at the reserve. This potential as a seed repository for local native vegetation planting projects adds to the significance of the Reserve.

Wetland Film


Rohe Koreporepo The Swamp, the Sacred Place Saturday 12 February - 4pm at Regent Theatre

Ian Hyde reported on Areas of Significant Conservation Value (ASCVs) in reference to what is in the District Plan.

- These have similar characters to Significant Natural Areas (SNAs).
- Was initially expecting a policy statement to come through this year but this has been pushed back due to legislative changes. Expecting to happen in the early part of next year. Expect it will be a resource intensive process. Have engaged Mike Harding to do some desktop analysis to see what needs to be done for the Biodiversity National Policy Statement.
- Hoping new Biodiversity Officer will be able to assist in this work.
- Could be a formal regulatory approach or there is potential for a collaborative approach or something in between. Favours the collaborative approach. Will allow land owners to actually be invested in the process.

TERMS OF REFERENCE

Biodiversity Advisory Group Terms of Reference

Purpose and Scope

The purpose of the advisory group is to:

- Coordinate the implementation of the Ashburton District Biodiversity Action Plan.
- Maintain partnerships between local and regional organisations with an interest in the management of indigenous biodiversity.
- Provide a forum for discussion and community-wide promotion of biodiversity.

Membership

Representatives on the working group were invited based on their organisation's participation in developing the Canterbury Regional Biodiversity Strategy, and/or their ability to contribute to the implementation of the Ashburton District Biodiversity Action Plan.

- Form project groups where appropriate to work towards specific actions in the Biodiversity Action Plan.
- Share information, both on organisational initiatives and collaborative initiatives, to support better decisions and knowledge of biodiversity.
- Communicate and consult with one another in a flexible and open way.
- Maintain confidentiality where appropriate.
- Represent their organisations' policies.
- Respect other organisations' governance and policy approaches and priorities in the district / region, and seek a consensus approach to work with these.

Reporting

The Ashburton District Biodiversity Advisory Group will report to Council.

Costs & Expenses

It is acknowledged that being a member of the advisory group will involve a commitment of members' time and energy, and will involve travel to Ashburton District Council to attend meetings. These costs will be met by the organisation(s) or group(s) that members represent. Costs of meetings and associated catering will be met by Ashburton District Council.

Meetings will generally be held in the Council meeting rooms, and may be held in other venues throughout the district as appropriate.
