




PART ONE DELIVERY OF SERVICE

1. ATTENDANCE

Visitor numbers for the Gallery decreased by a total 3,938 people over the 2019-20 year, representing an overall decrease of 18.2% from the previous year. The drop in visitations is predominantly attributed to the nationwide COVID-19 lockdown and the following months at alert level two. The Gallery was not able to operate at alert level three and remained closed to the public until 18 May, 2020. Visitor confidence was low throughout May and into June with very few public programmes and education programmes being on offer on site. Prior to the lockdown the Gallery was set to beat last year's visitation numbers.





2. EXHIBITIONS

In this reporting period the Gallery hosted a total of 19 exhibitions. Eleven of these were by local artists or curated from local art collections, while the remaining eight were from national collections, or artists working outside of the immediate district. Although the delivery of the exhibition programme was delayed during the COVID-19

lockdown, the community of artists and organisations the Gallery has been engaged with remained committed to their exhibitions and showed great agility in a time of great uncertainty.

The Gallery was delighted to host a significant touring exhibition by Te Papa Tongarewa featuring the work of master artist Auguste Rodin. The sculpture of *Eve* was on display along with other objects and books speaking to the technical ability and creative vision of the artist. Visitors greatly enjoyed viewing *Eve* and learning about the restoration and care of the sculpture at our national museum.

Another exhibition of note was *Tuhurahia te arapu Māori - AEIOU - Explore the Māori Alphabet* where the Gallery's collection was utilised alongside the Rotorua Museum collection to celebrate one of New Zealand's official languages. This dynamic and joyful exhibition allowed the Gallery team to work alongside Hakatere Marae and Arowhenua Marae to include special objects and taonga for visitors to enjoy.

The Gallery's own touring exhibition *The Water Project* was hosted by The Suter Gallery in Nelson from 17 February through to June 2020. The smaller satellite versions of the exhibition have also been shown in Wanaka, Pataka Art + Museum, Porirua and Aratoi, Museum of Art and History, Wairarapa.

EDUCATION AND PUBLIC PROGRAMMES

The Gallery's education and public programmes are designed and delivered specifically in conjunction with the exhibition program. These programmes are delivered in-house by Gallery staff and in collaboration with artists and practitioners. With the aim to promote lifelong learning and meaningful engagement with art, the programmes are designed to be inclusive, accessible and free to all.

In this reporting period, the Gallery maintained all of its established programmes such as In-Colour, Art Addicts and Jub Jub Club. During the lockdown period, the Gallery's education programmes were delivered through online learning, video tutorials and take-home kits.

In January we launched a new programme called Molly's Masterpiece which is designed to encourage regular (monthly) visitation by children and families. Molly (the Gallery's imaginary dog drawn by Ashburton-born artist David Elliot) appears in the Gallery every month, hidden in different spaces and invites visitors to take part in a creative activity. Once the activity is completed a puzzle piece is collected which will lead to a completed artwork from the Gallery's collection. To date Molly has attracted over 110 subscribers.

Prior to the COVID-19 lockdown, the Gallery's term-based school programmes had gained significant momentum. There is a noticeable need for creative learning outside the classroom, and the Gallery's curriculum-aware sessions are successfully meeting this demand. In this period a total of 2,040 children took part in structured learning programmes, representing 15 different schools ranging from early childhood to secondary.

Further to the above, the Gallery hosted six artist talks/lectures and an additional 21 public programmes including workshops, school holiday activities and hands-on learning.

In this period the Gallery held 29 Art Addicts sessions (15-25 participants per session on average) and 12 Jub Jub Club sessions and 3 virtual sessions (15-20 members per session).

3. THE GALLERY ART COLLECTION

The ongoing care and development of the Gallery's collection continues to be an area of focus for staff. Correct accessioning of newly gifted works, accurate documentation and safe housing have enabled more efficient use of the collection both for staff and those visiting the collection store. The Gallery continues to house the Ashburton Licensing Trust collection and part of the Ashburton District Council collection in its store.

In this period the Gallery Committee formally accepted 18 new works to the Gallery's permanent collection. Fifteen of these works were generously donated by one donor. The Committee also made the formal decision to consider for purchase the premier winning work from the annual Zonta Ashburton Female Art Award. This resulted in the purchase of *Totter* by the Janna van Hasselt for the collection.

Utilising the collection for exhibitions and for learning has been the main highlight of the year. Works from the collection were used as inspiration for the Ashburton College exhibition *Intersecting Views* and were also displayed as part of the *AEIOU* exhibition. Collection works were also incorporated in the Māori Language Cards 2019, and in school group visits.
