A COMMENT

I have had a busy month, although it takes very little to keep me busy these days.

I hosted visitors from the far away country of Morocco, I knew very little of Morocco except that a lot of our phosphate rock we use in the production of super phosphate is shipped from there. It is situated on the West coast of Africa with the Atlantic Ocean on one side and the Mediterranean Sea on the other side. There is a land area of 716,550 Sq KM, the land is mountainous and much of the population live at high altitudes. There is a considerable area of farmed land producing a variety of products including live-stock with an increasing dairy industry, other products are wheat, barley and vegetable crops plus a wine industry. The population 36,459,000 basically 36 million. The main language is Arabic, and their foreign languages are English and Spanish.

My guests the man was Hatim family name Zitouni and had spent the past thirteen years in France, he is an engineer by trade. His partner was Zineb family name Ait Hamadi, she had spent the past seven years in France as a consultant. They were very pleasant folk, very friendly and took a liking to my dog Leo while they made no comment re the cat Nick. I gathered she wasn't acceptable and may have been given that message as she remained outside for most of their visit!

Morocco is very much a Muslim country, I had thought I would take them up the Ashburton gorge and to Sharplin Falls but they requested to visit Christchurch, their only opportunity, they had



driven from further south to here and from here they had arranged to travel to Hokitika. They expressed a strong desire to visit the Mosque AI Noor, Deans Avenue where the shooting had taken place. This appeared to be a real priority, I agreed to take them there for the 12.30 gathering or whatever it is called. I imagined I would go for a walk or read a book in the car, but no, they urged me to accompany them.

This proved to be an interesting experience for me. We arrived just a few moments early. Hatim went to open the large solid wooden door to enter only to find it was securely locked. We stood back for a moment when next a sturdy looking man appears and in a very pleasant manner tells us it's his duty that day to check the would-be worshipers out ensuring that we carried no guns or weapons of any kind. He looked at me I guess having noted that I didn't appear to be a muslin. I reassured him that I carried no firearms or bombs and certainly meant no harm. After discussing the shooting with my guests which they appeared to be interested in, he felt in his trouser pocket and the door latch gave a click and we were ushered in. I guess the door locked firmly behind us. We removed our shoes and proceeded. Zineb being female turned to a room designated for females. Hatin showed me into the central chamber under the huge dome and indicated that I could sit on a form at the rear, this I did and Hatim excused himself as he had to wash to prepare for worship. In time he returned all washed I imagine. Shortly, others trickled in going to the front of this large meeting place, in time the leader appeared, well robed up and led the worship. All males, many I would call roughly dressed but I would be sure they were clean as that appeared to be an important issue. They stood, they kneeled at times very low with their faces on the well carpeted floor. The important man-made loud guttural-type noises none of which I could understand. After some time, we were ushered into a much smaller room where similar things took place, I was ignored or thought I was, the big man did stare very directly at me at one point, it may have been the first time he had become aware of me presence. Children were in another part, they disappeared as these prayers got under way, Towards the end of our time there a youngish man appeared, walked past me then turned and came back and shook my hand in a very warm manner, no words were spoken.

For me it was indeed an experience, I asked for a toilet and was shown to an impressive row, on entering I found it was not just a toilet but a well-equipped wash shower room with a slated floor a bit like a woolshed.

We left the Mosque for the Art Centre. I was looking forward to a coffee and some lunch. This I got as well as a look around an interesting shop. I noted that my guests chose to eat nothing Hatin did have a coffee I wondered if that was just to keep me company, Zenib had nothing although she may have had a small glass on water. We drove through the city Centre around the cathedral and then to the Riccarton Mall as they had requested to go to 'Pack & Save.' They appeared to have quite a complex shopping list. I returned to the car and relaxed there. They reappeared with bags of food items. I then learnt that they intended to cook my dinner which was wonderful. The first course was a Moroccan meal, chicken and many olives which I did eat but not my favorite. Dessert was a rhubarb pie served with a number of candles as the day was my birthday. I was eating rhubarb pie for several days, and I enjoyed the treat, the rhubarb was from my garden.

I must end there, as this story is getting beyond my limit.

At the August meeting of the Mayfield and Districts Lions we had two guest speakers.

Phil Everest who is part of a working group collating the communities" vision of the future" in relation to fresh water management in the region.

The working group held 29 meetings throughout the district, 622 people contributed to the information which will be presented and considered by Ecan, hopefully influencing the Regional Policy Statement.

The second speaker was Peter Reynolds aka "Razor" who runs a charity called Moral Compass.

Razor had a colourful upbring in South East London. Faced with jail or the British Army he chose the army where he excelled and became a paratrooper. After 10 tours to Afghanistan and a stint in the NZ Defence Force he retired to become a partner in a Christchurch business.

Stepping back from his business a little he also runs Moral Compass for youth who have lost their way. Moral Compass is a mentoring program developing essential life skills using outdoor education to deal with life challenges. Razor takes youth referred to him by the courts and social services, mentoring them to become productive members in the community. He seeks places to take his charges in the Canterbury region and can be contacted through his website Moral Compass.

The Old Post Office Library



Daffodil Day is here so that means spring is too. Perhaps not quite yet, but seeing those beautiful bright yellow flowers popping up everywhere brings hope that the season is changing. Many of us see spring as a frenzy of gardening but hopefully time for reading too, to rest those weary gardening muscles. Of the new books for this month, I have read three. And all of them absolutely held my interest from start to finish.

'A Better Place' by a NZ author Stephen Daisley. This is a set during World War 2 and is the story of twin boys who have grown up on a farm in the North Island . The author himself has worked on sheep and cattle stations as well as on oil and gas construction sites and as a truck driver, which all provides background experience enabling him to write authentically. In the 1940s, both twins sign up for war and leave NZ for all the excitement of fighting for their country. This book is incredibly moving and describes the war from the eyes of a humble shepherd , brilliantly. One of the best war books I have read and with a NZ flavour.

'A Rip in Heaven' by Jeanine Cummins. Some of you will recognise this author from her book 'American Dirt' and more recently 'The Outside Boy', both of which are already in the library.

This new book is true crime. And it happened within the author's family,: her brother and cousins. It is chilling. Unputdownable. And as I kept reminding myself, it all actually happened in real life, not just between the pages. Highly recommended.

'The Woman With a Cure' by Lynn Cullen. Set in the 1950's when the polio virus was rife in the world and scientists were racing to find a vaccine, notably Jonas Salk and Albert Sabin, there was a third in the race, Dorothy Horstmann. She was a key player in the drive to end polio, yet who has heard of her? She was also a major contributor to the rubella vaccine. She died at 89 in 2001 from Alzheimer's Disease. This is a well written novel based on fact . In this day and age we accept female scientists but it was a fight to be recognised back in 1940s and '50s, and this book is a reminder of how far we have come. It is another great read.

'Not Set in Stone' by David Vass.

Before 2015, David was one of NZ's leading mountaineers in the Southern Alps and particularly in Fiordland. However that part of his life ended abruptly with a life-altering accident in Fiordland's Darren Mountains which left him with a broken neck and incomplete tetraplegia. This book is mostly about the passion of a life in the mountains, and how David might form a new relationship with them while coming to terms with a very different world. The book has a stunning cover of 'Darkening Sky' (Tekapo) by artist Diana Adams. It is easy to spot in our non-fiction area.

'The Power of Trees' by Peter Wohlleben. This is a companion book of 'The Hidden Lives of Trees' by the same author which is also in the library. This book reminds us (quote) 'that trees are not the slow learners when it



comes to climate change we are'. The author shares astonishing discoveries about how trees pass knowledge to succeeding generations, helping them to survive climate change. A very readable book full of fascinating facts about trees and forests. This could sound boring, but the book is written in such a way that it truly isn't.

'One of Those Mothers' by Megan Nicol Read. I was asked to buy this book by one of our readers who had heard it reviewed on the radio.... or maybe it was TV.



It doesn't matter, we now have it on the shelves and it looks a great read ... a local father is convicted of the possession and distribution of child pornography. He is granted name suppression and it doesn't take long for suspicion and hysteria to rage amongst friends and neighbours. Who is it? And the wives? Whose husband has committed such a abominable offence and were they complicit? This sounds so good!

'Freedom from Anxiety' by Paul McKenna.

There must be plenty of worry and anxiety circulating just now, particularly amongst our farming community. And the old saying 'don't worry, be happy' just doesn't cut it anymore. This book is reputed to help train your mind to learn techniques of controlling those unpleasant feelings of anxiety, worry and stress.

It is not a textbook, it is simply written and easy to follow and makes sense. And it is interesting too. Published in 2023 so a modern book for modern times.

We are still hoping someone will volunteer to open the library an extra day or two. It's not hard..... just unlock, put the sign out, and then sit and read in the sun or on the couch for a couple of hours. As the days get warmer, more people visit our area or drive through Mt Somers and an open library is much more welcoming than a closed one! If you are new to the area it's a great way to meet people. The scrapbooks of the area conscientiously kept by Joyce Grieve are great reading to learn about this our district and are available for all to look at. Thank you to the Grieve family for donating these precious pictorial records to the library.

Keep reading, it helps keep our brains alive and well! AC.



Rural Licensing -Safer Mid Canterbury

As a driving programme we have a huge focus on road safety, so it's always a pleasure to have Sgt Burgerhout in class to talk safety and how to keep ourselves and other road users safe, and how not to come to the attention of the police.

He talked about what the police call RIDS – Restraints, Impairment, Distraction and Speed.

Restraints include seatbelts, child safety seats and airbags. Make sure you and your passengers are buckled in every time. Impairment includes alcohol, drugs and prescription drugs. Don't drink and drive, and make sure you check any prescription medicines in case they cause drowsiness.

Distractions include cell phones, your passengers and even adjusting the heater or radio station. Put down that cell phone and keep your eyes on the road.

Speed – keep to the speed limit and be especially careful around road works, schools and school buses. The speed limit has dropped to 30kph around schools and when passing a stationary school bus its 20kph.

Other issues that come up is mistakes and lapses in concentration. We all make mistakes from time to time and driving over familiar roads all the time can cause lapses in concentration. So keep up to date with the road rules and keep your mind on the job. Mistakes can be deadly and things can go wrong very quickly.

So drive to the conditions, keep your vehicle well maintained and follow the road rules and we will all get home safely.



Book of the Month – Mt Somers Library

Title: 'Foster' Author: Claire Keegan Publication year: 2010 (revised paperback version: 2022)



Over a decade ago, Irish author Claire Keegan wrote a novella called 'Foster' and last year this small literary gem was published in a revised paperback version, which has been obtained by the library. The 88-page work is set in 1980s rural Ireland and takes us into the head of a young, sensitive and somewhat unfortunate girl whose father is unloving and irresponsible and whose mother is burdened and down-trodden by a string of pregnancies and a money-poor, messy household. When the latter is due to have another baby during the summer period, the girl gets sent to relatives on the coast not knowing if or when she'll return.

Mr. and Mrs. Kinsella open up a whole new world to her; on their farm, there is love, cleanliness, work ethic, relaxation and laughter. The girl blossoms, but stays a bit tense: "And so the days pass. I keep waiting for something to happen, for the ease I feel to end" (p. 37). And the reader feels the anxiety with her. Keegan upholds this tension throughout the story through mystery and ambivalent dialogue. The girl senses there is something unsaid in the Kinsella household, but what is it? She sleeps in a boy's room and a wears a boy's clothes (her father did not even think to give her any), but "there is no sign anywhere of a child" (p. 8). Mr Kinsella one

day looks at her and suggests she needs fine girl's clothes; Mrs. Kinsella runs upstairs for a cry - what does it all mean? The reader can guess more than the girl, but Keegan leaves gaps for conjecture and thereby creates a feeling of unease. The reader, like to girl, is constantly bracing for something bad to happen. What eventually unfolds will affect the reader profoundly.

'Foster' is tender, poignant and poetic, like



the little girl. It also does a fine job at creating a sense of place. Most of the dialogue is in the Irish vernacular ("How's your mammy?", "Did ye get sorted?") and there are both lyrical and down-toearth descriptions of the countryside and the beach. The local community comes alive in conversations about the practicalities of farming (butter mountains, lost heifers and the price of hay) as well as in a chapter about a Catholic wake where there is grieving but also drinking and gossiping. Keegan is masterful with language and ambience and has deservedly won the Davy Byrnes Award for this piece of writing. If you have a moment to spare, go read it. It will touch your heart.

A lot of planning and preparation went into it with a trip into Ashburton to buy chips, drinks, glo sticks and spot prizes! We were super lucky to have Ethan McWilliams from Christchurch Party Hire supply us with lighting, sound and a smoke machine!! All the children dressed according to the theme and a fun night was had by all with dance games and a limbo challenge for parents and the children!

Earlier that same day our senior students performed at the Hakatere Festival at the Events Centre in Ashburton and my goodness, did they make us proud!! For many, it was their first time performing and despite the nerves they smiled, sang with volume and danced in unison. Our tamariki have been tutored all year by Nerina Hawkins, an amazing teacher who travels to Mayfield from Rolleston each Monday to teach te reo and kapa haka. They have learned so much from her already and are looking forward to once again hitting the stage at the Opuke Cultural Festival (at Rakaia School on the 7th of September) where they will share their amazing talents.



What a Difference

'Consider it a sheer gift, friends, when tests and challenges come at you from all sides.' (James 1: Verse 2)

Have you heard of Phillip Brooks? He was one of the great preachers of a previous generation. He began his career as a schoolteacher and both he and his advisors had every reason to believe that he would do well. But he was a failure. He went home to his parents mortified beyond words. In the midst of his depression, there came to him a clear call to the Christian ministry. At first he pushed it aside, but the call grew louder and louder. He was led on step by step to become a preacher of amazing influence, gaining a position of high esteem on both sides of the Atlantic.

He says in a sermon the 23rd Psalm: 'In the hours of my humiliation, if anyone had said to me that "God's goodness and mercy" were following hard on my heels, I would have considered them an imbecile. *But they did!* How differently I might have responded if I had believed then, as I believe now, that His goodness and mercy are my constant companions.' How differently indeed!


