## Masters target world swim records

World records will be on the line when EA Networks Centre hosts the South Island short course masters championships this weekend.

It is an important event for the masters swimming community and a world record attempt will be made in the 800m freestyle.

The Ashburton event is one of only two sanctioned masters meets in New Zealand this year and the only meet in Canterbury offering the opportunity to swim for New Zealand and world records.

About 80 swimmers, between 20 and 90 plus, and their partners and families, are expected in Ashburton for the weekend.

Sport and Recreation Manager Richard Wood said it was a great opportunity for the pool to host what promised to be an exciting event.

"There will be at least one attempt on a world record and the meet offers a chance for swimmers from all over the country to compete against each other, to set personal best times and have a go at some records.

"It will also have a positive economic impact on the district as all our visitors dine out and shop in the local shops."

The technical director for the meet is Ashburton district's Helen Tait, a qualified New Zealand swim national referee, while the Ashburton Swim Team will assist with other duties and timekeeping.



Most swimmers will arrive in Ashburton on Friday, with racing sessions on Friday night, Saturday morning and Saturday night. Swimmers attend a dinner at the Hotel Ashburton on Saturday night.

The meet is held annually and will be in Christchurch next year.

"It is a fantastic pool for competitions, with 10 lanes and capacity to host at least 100 swimmers and we look forward to some great swimming over the weekend."

# Balancing the books for longterm wellbeings

The cost of living affects us all, whether it is balancing your household budget, a business forecast or the council's budget.

Our long term plan is how we prioritise spending when we undertake the four wellbeings: economic, social, cultural and environmental.

So what are wellbeings?

Social – this refers to people's basic needs, such as education, health, security and the strength of our community networks.

Economic – this helps drive our economic growth. If we get this right, better jobs and higher economic growth help us to satisfy the other wellbeings – a good example is our north-east Ashburton Business Estate and the new rail hub at Fairton.

Cultural – this is our diverse community and their ability to express and preserve their identities. The building of Te Whare Whakatere and our involvement in Community House and Safer Mid Canterbury are examples of this. Supporting last weekend's Night Noodle Market is another.

Environmental – this is our natural environment and its ability to sustainably support us, and it covers water, air, land use and pollution.

All these wellbeing things cost lots of money. We are lucky in Ashburton that previous councils have been prudent and have maintained our assets to good levels. However, as society develops, expectations of what is acceptable change ... and rightly so, what was okay 20 years ago is not okay today.

Drinking water quality is a good example of this and council has a big work programme to ensure it continues to comply with new national standards. Methven's new \$10m membrane treatment plant means boil water notices will be at thing of the past for that supply and the facility is due to be fully commissioned later this month.



We have just started our work to review the long team plan and went out to the community for some initial feedback that will help us develop a draft long term plan that will go out for consultation early next year.

Due to there only being so much money to go around, we will have the difficult task of deciding what council can and can't afford. We must all remember that the more we want, the more rates have to increase and so a balance has to be achieved.

Finally, congratulations to Mt Hutt on reaching 50 years, which is a magnificent milestone.

It is one of our longtime local attractions only made possible by some visionary residents of the Ashburton district.

It only takes one person with vision to make things happen and Ashburton has proven to have an amazing ability to get behind these visions and make them happen. What's your vision?

## Ooodles enjoy noodles by night

Crowds of hungry noodle-lovers thronged to the West Street car park on Saturday to sample a range of global flavours at the district's inaugural Night Noodle Market.

The event was hosted by the Mid Canterbury Newcomers Network and Ashburton District Council to observe the start of Welcoming Week and Multicultural

Mercedes Walkham, Coordinator for Mid Canterbury Newcomers Network, said she was thrilled with the community's support of the event.

"It was such a wonderful way to say 'nau mai rā, glad you're here' to the people who have made Ashburton their home. With the wide range of nationalities taking part, I think the event gave people more appreciation of the rich mix of cultures that make up our Mid Canterbury community."

Council said the event was hugely successful, with organisers estimating that around 4000 to 5000 people attended over the course of four hours.

Group Manager Compliance and Development Jane Donaldson said it wasn't just the street vendors who were busy on the night.

"The five restaurants participating in the noodle market had a lot of customers through their doors, but we also saw diners spill over to other local restaurants as well, so we consider that a real win-win for Ashburton."

"We've already had people asking us about when the next Night Noodle Market is going to be," Mrs Walkham said. "We'd probably need to make any future event quite a bit bigger and invite more vendors, but having to cater for large crowds is a really good problem to have."

### Taskforce looks at lake water

Proactively getting ahead of algal blooms has prompted the formation of the Lake Hood Water Quality Taskforce.

Representatives from the Ashburton Aquatic Park Charitable Trust, the **Huntingdon Park Property Owners** Association, Lake Hood Extension Project an Ashburton District Council have come together to improve water quality at the lake. This follows a one-off algae bloom at the lake in March.

Taskforce chair David West said the aim was to prevent further algal blooms, using

scientific expertise to better understand conditions that encouraged algae growth.

"We want to make sure Lake Hood remains a premier recreational destination for visitors and locals. Algae blooms are becoming more prevalent worldwide and the taskforce wants to be proactive and act early so we won't see a repeat this summer."

Six aeration diffusers have already been installed, to help clean the water.

Property owners around Lake Hood are also being encouraged to support efforts to improve water quality.
