Obligations & Responsibilities

Did you know all dog owners must use or carry a leash when in public? Your dog must be on a leash unless in a designated dog exercise area.

Did you know dogs not wearing their registration tag at all times may be deemed unregistered? It is a legislative requirement that your companion must wear their licence tag at all times (see below for tips on how to put licence tag on the collar).

Did you know it's an offence for failing to keep

your dog under control? Having your dog under control is as much about the safety of your dog as it is about the safety of other dogs and other people, including in dog parks. Care should be taken if your dog is not used to socialising with other dogs, or is known to be aggressive.



Micro-chipping provides a simple, life-long way to identify dogs and link them to their owner. It is compulsory for all newly registered dogs after July 2006 (except working farm dogs) to be micro-chipped. If your dog has been impounded or declared as dangerous or menacing, it will need to be micro-chipped even if it was first registered before July 2006.

Note: A working dog is a dog that is kept solely for the purpose of herding or driving stock.

Registration licence tag tips

Did you know that you can soften the strap to make it bend a little more easily around your pooch's collar?

Place your new dog licence tag in a cup or saucer of boiling water

Leave for 10 - 12 seconds

Remove the strap out of the boiling water (use kitchen tongs to prevent scolding or burning your fingers)

Bend the tag around your dog's collar.

Charged on impound and every 24 hours thereafter. Impounded dogs must be registered, micro-chipped and all fees paid before release. Please note that owners of unclaimed dogs are also liable for fees and euthanasia costs.



Children & Dog exercise areas

Council recognises the importance of exercise for dogs and to provide the opportunity for dogs and their owners to exercise and socialise together in the dog parks across the district. Although children are allowed in dog parks, **care must be taken by parents or guardians to ensure they are protected from potential dog related accidents or injuries.** Dog parks are primarily a space for dogs to socialise and exercise with other dogs.

Skate parks are designed for the use and enjoyment of children and teenagers. Children and teenagers are disproportionately represented in dog bite and injury statistics. Speed and noise of a skate park may excite or provoke a dog. **Ensuring dogs are not in skateboard areas makes them safe for children and teenagers to use.**

Barking Dogs

Excessive barking is tiresome and repetitive. It's one of the common dog complaints reported to councils. Barking is their natural means of communication. Your dog may be barking due to a lack of stimulation, especially if left alone during the day. Dogs often bark when owners are not home and this can be disturbing for their neighbours.

Preventing Excessive Barking

Ensure your dog is comfortable and is exercised regularly; and make sure the dog has toys to amuse itself with when alone, such as bones or balls. Leave your dog with friends or a boarding kennel when away for long periods of time and house your dog so it's unable to see things to bark at.

Registering Online

Jumping online is the easiest way to register your dog and make your registration payment. When re-registering, all you'll need is your dog number. If your dog's registration details have changed, such as a new address, ownership or they are now deceased, you will need to contact us by email or phone to update your details before you can re-register.
