

Les Vincent's Grandfather ran the Vincents Lime works and kiln from 1940s to 1960s.





'Mothers' Instinct' by Barbara Abel.


Described as a dark intense domestic thriller about next door neighbours whose close friendship is upended by a tragic accident. It has now been made into a major motion film.


The author Barbara Abel has been called the 'queen of Belgian thrillers' and has written 14 novels. This the first to translated into English.

A COMMENT:

My very latest reading the book "Wavewalker" Breaking free. This is the story of a family the two parents and two preteen children who purchase a sailing boat and leave England to follow the third voyage of captain Cook around the world. The aim to mark the 200th anniversary of Cooks final voyage. This was a very ambitious plan. A sea going sailing yacht was found and purchased, extra crew taken on and eventually they sailed from Plymouth on the first stage to Rio de Janeiro. This was relatively calm compared with what was to follow.

From Rio they set sail for Cape Town with a brief stop at Tristan da Cunha where they were able to restock with supplies before sailing for Cape Town. At which place they were made very welcome, restocking, and carrying out repairs, the south Atlantic had been rough sailing. The voyage across the Southern Indian Ocean proved to be very rough, the yacht suffered serious damage when they struck what must have been a rogue wave. Wavewalker was badly damaged with broken planks and constant water leaks, the author then seven years old was thrown from her bunk and suffered severe head injuries. They were sailing for Freemantle, but Sue had serious injuries and the yacht was in a bad way. They had no choice but to aim for a small island by the name of Ile Amsterdam which was occupied by the French where there was a weather station. The risk was that they may sail past without sighting this very small island. It was sighted they landed, and the family where allocated a house to spend time at, there was a resident doctor who was able to attend to Sue's injuries having to operate on her brain but without aesthetic as he did not have the correct product. This was particularly traumatic for Sue and no doubt painful, after several operations over several days the



doctor declared he was finished, and Sue had no further headaches. Her life was saved. The yacht was repaired as best they could although it continued to leak. The French and the British declared that the yacht was not safe for the children and mother to sale on to Freemantle leaving the three men to make the voyage. Arrangements were made for the children and Mary the mother to travel on a passing container ship. The problem was getting onto the ship which rises the equivalent of a six-story building above the sea, a ladder was lowered over the side they were told to just keep climbing and not look down, Sue said she did look down. They all got on board and experienced a very comfortable voyage to Melbourne and had to take a flight back to Freemantle and wait for Wavewalker to arrive.

Their adventure continues sailing Freemantle to Melbourne, then to Sydney, joining in the Sydney to Hobart yacht race, they completed the race being the last boat to arrive, but then they did arrive numerous yachts had withdrawn due to rough seas.

It was then Hobart to New Zealand a short stop at Queen Charlotte Sound a visit to Wellington then to Auckland where they had their engine rebuilt. At each main stop they had a change of crew which were paying passengers and were expected to help in manning the yacht, some were very good, some otherwise, some complained of the food served, Mary had to inform them this was not a luxury cruise liner. Leaving Auckland with a new crew they sailed into the Pacific Ocean visiting and revisiting numerous islands. With changes in paying passengers. Then to Australia and back to the islands, returning to Australia where the parents gained employment to earn much need money and for Sue and her brother Jon to attend school at last.

Sue had a very strong desire for education and like her father was very determined, she was a very conscientious student studying on correspondence and gaining very high marks. She felt somewhat imprisoned on the boat being very dominated by her father and not getting along very well with her mother. The reader can learn how to catch frogs and dissect them on the kitchen bench when mum is out, all part of her biology course sending her findings back to her tutor in Australia.

So that is "Wavewalker' the name of the book by Suzanne Heywood and the name of the Yacht that she together with her brother Jon and their parents sailed the world and had many adventures. This book is recommended reading available at bookshops and Fishpond or Amazon. Next time I may write about Waiuta a ghost town not far from Reefton. I feel I need to visit there before writing. There was the Waiuta mine and the Prohibition Mine with a shaft descending nearly 900m going well below sea level. Waiuta was the richest and most productive of the area's gold mines, with around half of all the gold mined on the West Coast coming from this one mine.






Potential Dawn Service – Mt Somers Hall


