

Water services plan adopted

Council's Water Services Delivery Plan was adopted last week and has now been filed with the Department of Internal Affairs.

Every council in the country must have their water services plan approved by DIA as part of Government reforms for drinking water, wastewater and stormwater.

Councillors adopted Ashburton's plan at their meeting last week and it sets out how the district will sustainably deliver and fund safe and reliable water services over the next decade.

Key elements are:

- Council will continue to deliver drinking water, wastewater and stormwater services via an in-house Stand Alone Business Unit
- The proposed investment programme is financially sustainable
- Water services revenue will be clearly separated from other Council funds
- Council has enough headroom to borrow for unexpected events

The plan will strengthen service delivery and ensure compliance, including asset management and maintenance strategies, financial monitoring, governance improvements and alignment with



upcoming legislative requirements

The plan outlines projected increases in water services charges/rates over the next 10 years, from \$1441 in 2024/25 to \$2948 in 2033/34.

Councillors adopting the plan last Wednesday, noted that the new structure for water services would generate a lot more work in the stormwater, data analysis, information and reporting space, and that this could result in up to four new water services jobs.

Democracy and Engagement Group Manager Toni Durham said Council would now wait for DIA to approve the plan, and then the new Council elected in the coming local elections would decide on the governance structure for the Stand Alone Business Unit.

The water services unit would have its own long term plan that would feed into Council's long term plan, with the transition and implementation period expected to be about two years.

WATER WORKS

Line Road changes

Tru-Line Civil has made a start on installation of new wastewater pipes at Line Road, Methven, however the order of work has changed. They are working first between McCloy's Road and Dolma Street, then between Dolma and Methven Chertsey Road. There is a one-way closure on McCloy's Road currently, with stop-go management planned later at Dolma Street and Line Road, and closure between Dolma Street and Methven Chertsey Road in the final stage.

Community members interested in the future of the Brothers stockwater intake are invited to a meeting at the Mayfield Hall on 2 September, 4pm, and encouraged to have their say via an online survey (ashburtondc.govt.nz/services/projects/ashburton-district-stockwater-network). The Alford Forest intake survey is open for feedback, until Monday 1 September.

Reduced flows

Council is alerting properties on its stockwater service that reduced flows are likely next month, when the Rangitata Diversion Race will close on 1 September for a three-week maintenance period.

Election orange is the new black



It's hard to believe that this is the last week of winter, in meteorological terms.

In the next few weeks we will see fields of yellow daffodils break into bloom around Tinwald and Ashburton. While yellow is the colour of spring, orange is the colour of the local elections and you will see more of it too, as the voting period gets under way.

Voting papers will be arriving in your letterboxes from 9 September and voters have a month to return them, either by post or by depositing them into the secure orange ballot boxes that will be dotted around the district.

In the Ashburton District, we'll be voting for one mayor and seven councillors (five in the Ashburton ward and two in the Western ward) - the two Eastern ward councillors have

already been decided as there were only two nominations, and the five Methven Community Board members have been decided too, with matching nominations.

Voters will also be asked to choose two representatives on Environment Canterbury and six for the Braided Rivers Community Trust.

It was great to see a good turnout to a meet-the-candidate evening in Methven last week and, as I write this on the eve of the Ashburton event, I expect another good showing in town.

Technology willing, the Ashburton event was livestreamed and should be available as a recorded session via our Council website and social media channels.

It's important to be as informed as possible when you vote, as these elected members will have a big impact on our daily lives, from parks to potholes, over the next three years.

ROADING NOTICES

Line Road, Methven - Parts of Line Road will be closed to traffic until mid-October while new wastewater pipes are installed. Tru-Line Civil is laying about 800 metres of pipe from Methven's wastewater treatment plant west along Line Road to the township, and initially Line Road will be closed between Dolma Street and McCloys Road. Detours are in place.

King and Alexander Streets, Chertsey - Closed until 13 September while a new water treatment plant is built. The road closure does not impact school access.

Philip Street - Sections closed at times between Oak Grove and Walker Street until mid-September while new water pipes are installed by Rooney Earthmoving. Resident access remains.

Mason Place - Mason Place will be closed to traffic until 31 October, while new water pipes are installed. Access for residents remains.

Tancred Street - Closed between William Street and Chalmers Avenue until end of August while new water pipes are installed by Rooney Earthmoving. Resident access remains.

Thomson Street - Closed at Carters Terrace intersection on 4 and 5 September while EA Networks installs utility cables as part of its underground conversion project.

Tinwald viaduct - Melcombe Street, under the Tinwald viaduct, is temporarily closed pending repairs by KiwiRail.
