Recycled devices off to new homes

An army of teens is busy refurbishing donated laptops in the Ashburton District and giving them to families who need them.

Sixteen laptops were refurbished by young people at the Ashburton Public Library last month and Ashburton College students are also meeting weekly to take part in the Recycle A Device programme.

Recycle A Device (RAD) is a national programme and Sarah Jones, Digital Access Coordinator at the Ashburton Public Library, has been trained to deliver it in our district.

The aim of the programme is to teach teens some practical technical skills, and end up with laptops that can be given to people, families and groups in the community that need them.

RAD national tutor Riley Pugh said the teens learned new skills, and some were inspired to think about technology as a possible career.

"The goal is to teach the fundamentals about what is inside a computer and how it all goes together. We get them to open up the computer and see what is inside, fix it and then it can go to a new home.

"Participants range in their experience with technology, from none to knowledgeable, so we try to make sure everyone learns something."

RAD laptops are mostly donated by corporates, after being used by staff for 3-4 years. The devices have a life of 10 years, so RAD helps recycle them, fit new batteries and clean the interior as needed.



Sometimes a new operating system is installed.

Riley said RAD programmes were set up in schools and communities around the country and the refurbished laptops given to those who needed them.

"It's estimated that 100,000 students don't have access to a computer and that makes a huge difference to their learning. Typing a four-page essay is certainly a lot easier than handwriting it."

The refurbishing sessions start with theory then progress to the practical, using diagnostic skills to see what needs fixing and working with screwdrivers and soldering irons to make repairs.

All 16 devices refurbished at the library last month already have new homes.

Ashburton College sessions are being held weekly during lunch breaks throughout Term 2.

Don't have a laptop and want to access a refurbished device?

Applications for a refurbished device can be made at the library from June.
Applicants must be under 25 and needing a laptop for study or work; or over 25 with a current Community Services card and needing a laptop for study or work.

There will be a waitlist created for devices, as they will be worked on during the school year.

Be a hero during road safety week

The lights on Ashburton's clock tower will glow yellow and residents are being asked to wear yellow or tie a yellow ribbon on their vehicle for the week.

Glow in the Park is returning this year to the Tinwald Domain over King's Birthday weekend and organisers are flat out finalising all the dazzling details.

The three-night light spectacle will feature artistic and interactive light installations, including glow in the dark 10 pin bowling, as well as a bigger dining area with a good variety of food trucks.

Council Chief Executive Hamish Riach said the 2022 glow event had been hugely popular and was attended by about 10,000 people over the three nights.

"So we are back in the same space and working to create another trail of special effects lights winding around the domain and Tinwald Plains historical precinct.

"We had such good feedback from the

Drinking Water is essentially about finding a fair way to fund the upgrade to Methven's new water treatment plant, with Council proposing to bring residents in Methven-Springfield, who share the supply with Methven, into the District Water Group.

The proposal would see costs spread across the entire group, but would also have an impact on water rates for those in Methven-Springfield, particularly those using large quantities of water for agricultural purposes.

With only a few days left until submissions close, the Council is urging residents on the scheme and in the wider group to submit their feedback. The consultation period closes 5pm, this Sunday.

Land use and subdivision consent is sought to subdivide a heritage listed property into a total of eight residential allotments at 4 Wilkin Street in Tinwald.

The application site is 4,047m2 in area and contains an existing dwelling and associated outbuildings. The site and buildings are listed as a Category B items (H72) in the Ashburton District Plan Heritage schedule. As part of the proposal land use consent is sought for the removal of existing outbuildings and redevelopment of the site. The existing dwelling will be retained.

The proposed subdivision seeks to create a total of eight residential allotments. The existing dwelling would be located within proposed Lot 4 which is 1,060m2 in size. The remainder of the residential allotments will vary in size between 362m2 and 506m2. In addition, it is proposed to create two allotments for corner splays (Lots 9 & 10).
