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Methven primed for walking festival

Registrations opened yesterday for Methven's new walking festival, which will take place in and around Methven over Easter and the first week of the school holidays and feature 16 different walks – scarecrows and an enchanted forest included.

Deputy Mayor Liz McMillan is one of 12 on the organising committee and said the walks were suitable for a wide range of ages and fitness and included a food and wine trail, a dog walk, an enchanted forest walk and a hike into the Woolshed Creek hut that was part of the Mt Somers track.

"We've got something for everyone and crossing our fingers that the new Sharplin Falls track will also be ready by then and able to be part of the programme. Even before registrations opened we've had good interest in the wine and food trail, which will include food and beverages from four Methven restaurants within walking distance of each other.

"I am also really looking forward to the dog walk, which will take in dog-friendly parts of town and the Methven dog park."

Details about the 16 walks available between 8 April and 16 April are on the festival's website **www. methvenwalkingfestival.nz**, along with registration forms.

Children's events include the annual scarecrow trail, which opens on 8 April and runs all school holidays, the enchanted forest and fairy walk, and the ramble around Awa Awa Rata Reserve, where children can find a token hidden in the famous bush and exchange it for an Easter egg.



For the serious walkers, there are longer hikes into Woolshed Creek hut and to Scotts Saddle. Several other walks have a historic flavour and share details of how Methven and the surrounding district and foothills developed.

Ms McMillan said the organising committee had been meeting regularly for a year to plan, and while some of the walks were free, those with entry fees would see the money donated to the different groups that managed the walks, like the Mt Somers Walkway Society.

"Methven used to have a walking festival many years ago and we rejuvenated a couple of their most popular walks and added a few more. We see this as a festival that could run annually or every two years and help showcase all the different walks available in our beautiful Methven district.

"We hope that locals will join us and that people from outside the area will come and stay for a few days and take part in several walks."

The festival has been supported by local businesses and with grants, including \$6500 over two years from the Regional Event Fund administered by Council.

Ms McMillan said the combined grants had helped organisers set up a professional website and undertaking marketing and promotion.

"These are the financial boosts that often help a fledgling event off the ground. We really appreciated that help and hope the walking festival becomes a regular and successful event for Methven and the district."

Thank you for your flood relief donations

I want to begin with a heartfelt thank you to the residents of our district that have made donations to help people up north affected by Cyclone Gabrielle as they piece their lives back together.

As at Tuesday this week, our Flood Relief Fund had a total of \$11,200 in it and the account will stay open for some time yet if you want to help grow the donations. In these sorts of disasters, cash is the best way to help and donors can specify which region they want their money sent to.

As part of an initiative by Local Government New Zealand, our council has "adopted" Masterton District Council, where some of their rural areas were badly flooded by rain that was part of the cyclone's wide and destructive path. The devastating effects of Gabrielle are going to be felt for a long time, and Masterton District has suffered loss and destruction and needs our help. Ashburtonians are renowned for our ability to rally around and support each other in hard times, so I have faith that we will answer the call to help Masterton residents who need it.

Please don't rush out and buy items or clear out something you have at home to donate, as the logistics to transport things to the North Island are far too complicated and costly. Cash is king as it's so easily accessible for the people who need to rebuild their lives.

On the home front, councillors have devoted plenty of time and energy into the Annual Plan for 2023-24 and we are tracking for an average 5.99 per cent rate rise across the district. We've deferred some non-critical work in the water space, but added an extra \$1 million to the roading budget – overall, this is not a bad result, given inflation is at 7.2 per cent and the rising cost of living is affecting us all.

I also had the pleasure recently of being invited to speak at the official opening ceremony of the Ashburton Methodist parish church on Baring Square East – the church was closed for 13 years after the Christchurch earthquakes and has been strengthened and rebuilt, and is open again for business.

The church is looking fantastic and will blend in nicely with the new library (Te Pātaka o kā Tuhituhi) and civic centre (Te Waharoa a Hine Paaka) and the redeveloped Baring Square East which will be completed later this year.

We look forward to being good neighbours.



The late councillor Rodger Letham had a connection to the church and I am sure his wonderful singing voice is missed, as is his presence around the Council table.

Rodger certainly leaves big shoes to fill and the by-election to fill his seat on the Western Ward is currently under way. Nominations close on Thursday 16 March and a postal vote will be required if there is more than one nomination.

Isabel, who designed some of the artwork in the campaign, said she enjoyed learning new skills at Youth Council gatherings and workshops.

"I hope we gain more youth councillors in the coming year who will bring new perspectives. If you are creative or inquisitive, then you would make a great AYC member."

Cr Phill Hooper and Cr Russell Ellis are the elected members attached to the Youth Council and attend their meetings. Cr Hooper said it was a great opportunity for young people to make their mark on the community and provide a youth

perspective on the important decisions that will affect the next generation of residents.

"We're keen to get events for young people going again. In the past, the Youth Council have run things like skate jams and Bite Night. We know young people learn a lot by organising these events and they also help make our district more vibrant for everyone."

AYC member Maddie said learning to run events was a great skill to develop, and members also had the chance to strengthen their leadership abilities.

"Even if you don't see politics or local government in your future, the knowledge and skills you gain from being part of the team will benefit you no matter what your future holds." Cr Ellis said parents should think about encouraging their own, or other young people, to apply. "If you have a young person at home who enjoys planning events or leadership roles, and who might appreciate the opportunities that Youth Council can bring, then definitely encourage them to apply."

Sophia, another youth councillor, agrees. She said she's loved the opportunity to give back to the community through volunteering at events and enjoyed interacting with elected councillors.

"I think that the Youth Council is an amazing opportunity for the youth of Ashburton. I truly love being part of it, and it has helped me grow as a person."

Poo pipes perfectly placed

The final pieces of pipe in the North West Ashburton wastewater extension were laid underground on Allens Road recently, but not before attracting a bit of attention because of their unusual shape.

The final 64 metre section of pipes is larger in diameter than all the other pipes in the 2km of new network and designed to act as a storage chamber for wastewater coming from the north-west.

The fibreglass storage pipes were laid in a trench dug in the middle of Allens Road between Mill Creek and Carters Road, next to a pump station that will pump the wastewater to Middle Road and the town's

main wastewater network. The north west extension will cater for residential growth.

Infrastructure and Open Spaces Group Manager Neil McCann said the additional storage volume is required to accommodate sudden surges, which often happen on rainy days.

"A surge is often the result of more people being inside on rainy days or when water in the ground gets into the wastewater system. Based on future developments in the Farm Road, Carters Road, Allens Road area, the extension required 287 cubic metres of storage, and this storage pipe helps us achieve that."

The storage pipe has a 40-year lifespan.
