He leaves behind his newly pregnant wife in mission barracks where she does not relish the idea of being so confined while husband is away exploring. Both husband and wife are sorely tested by the very different paths society expects them to tread. Out on display now.

And the new high country book 'Awatere' has arrived, currently being covered professionally to keep it in its pristine condition. It should be on the shelves next week.

One of our readers accidentally spilt something on one of our newer books, 'Knock Knock' by Anders Roslund. As required she has replaced the copy so it is now back waiting to entertain more readers. It is a very good crime read.

A COMMENT:

It has been said that "Necessity is the mother of invention." This certainly tends to be the situation when a person and society is thrown into unexpected situations.

This was undoubtedly what happened in the Christchurch earthquake, with water pipes broken and sewage damaged and not usable. We have now a similar situation over much of the North Island following severe tornadoes and excessive flooding. There will have to be temporary housing and there will be many houses with serious water damage where lining will have to stripped out and replaced, much furniture will have to be replaced, drives and roads rebuilt and then there are bridges over rivers and streams gone and needing urgent replacement. But everything takes time and manpower and machinery. There will be many in isolated areas who may remain with difficult access for a long period to come.

As I listened to the early news this morning, I heard the mention of 'Bailey bridges.' For many years it was common to be crossing Baiely bridges when driving over the Lewis Pass. Many of these bridges were over streams at shingle slides, often with a ford nearby for heavy traffic.

The one bridge which I remember was over the Buller River several km South of Murchison, this was O'Sullivan's bridge at the upper end of the Buller Gorge. The old timber structure built early 1900's collapsed under the weight of a heavy logging truck carting logs from the New Creek area to Andersons mill at Murchison, the driver survived with only minor injuries. Without this bridge the journey from Nelson to the West Coast was considerably longer forcing traffic to travel up the Maruia valley and over the Rahu saddle. The Ministry of Works got into action and over a relatively short period built a large Bailey bridge with sourcing bridge parts from all over New Zealand. It was a major project, the main span was 51 metres (147 feet), according to the internet it was completed in just two months, I was there, if anyone asks me I would say more like two years, certainly one year. However, the bridge was built, and it was very successful. It was ten years before the permanent structure which you drive over today was built a short distance downstream. The Bailey bridge filled a very important gap in the roading system to the West Coast.

It is a very old system of temporary bridging I understand originally developed during the early part of WWII. I remember my grandmother saying it was one of the good things that came out of the war, my Father mumbled and said I think we could have managed without them, that is the Bailey Bridge!

They certainly have had their value in getting quick access following floods and other disasters. Now they will come into their own in the North Island following these recent disasters. The life of a Bailey I understand is about ten years, they are quick to erect and fill an important gap. For those North Island East Coast regions, the Bailey bridge will, without doubt be a life saver. For those unfortunate folk who have lost so much, homes farms, orchids, their way of life we can all help in our own small way, many small donation accumulate to be a large donation and can make a difference to those affected people and communities, as it has been said a lot of drops fill a bucket.

Hospice Mid Canterbury Learning to Adapt Living and Farming with MS

Craig is a local farmer, and like many farmers, faces many challenges. However he has had to battle more than most, with a diagnosis of Multiple Sclerosis (MS) thirty years ago.

In the early 1990s, Craig was running 300 cattle and a few sheep on his 150-hectare farm. At that time, he started to have difficulty walking and was eventually diagnosed with MS. With his wife's help and meeting up with other people with MS, he came to accept the prognosis. "I just changed my thinking and got on with what life had to offer."

One of the most difficult things for Craig has been asking for help from others. "I can only thank them for their support and understanding."

Craig has had to change and adapt his thinking and his practices. In 2010 he leased out the farm. While he uses crutches and has some difficulty getting in and out of the ute, he continues to help out on the farm, feeding

out, cutting firewood and doing general work. He has been known to take his mobility scooter out in the paddock to get work done, although he has learnt its limitations the hard way.

While Craig is fiercely independent, Hospice has provided support, mainly in the form of the exercise class with Matt Roxburgh from the EA Networks Gym. Craig has been a Hospice client for a number of years and was quick to see the benefits of exercise therapy class for his condition, strengthening muscles and helping him maintain mobility, as well as providing social contact. He has also enjoyed Armchair Travel.

Courage, tenacity and adaptability have meant that Craig continues to work around the challenges he faces, making the most of every day.

Supporting people through Cyclone Gabrielle Jo Luxton, MP for Rangitata 23 February 2023

The unprecedented and wide spread destruction of Cyclone Gabrielle is having a devastating impact on our communities across much of the North Island. Alongside the huge impact we've seen in urban areas we've seen our North Island farmers and growers hugely affected by flood waters, and debris. Milk

collection has been disrupted, orchards inundated with silt and we're seeing livestock losses across much of the North Island.

The Government is here to help our rural communities affected by the Cyclone, and is providing \$25 million to kick-start recovery efforts for farmers, growers, and rural communities significantly affected by Cyclone Gabrielle. We have been on the ground in the affected regions and listened to farmers and growers as we have put this package together. The \$25 million funding will go towards grants for

are teams on the ground in the regions supporting rural communities and helping where they can.

We know that the impacts of an event of this scale will be felt for months and years to come. The damage and debris is likely to exacerbate feed issues experienced by some farmers in flood-affected areas. As with our flood event here, MPI is restarting the national Feed Working Group, working a partnership with sector groups and specialist providers to monitor feed availability.

While the devastation of Gabrielle is becoming clearer, the full impact is yet to be realized and the Government is ready to provide further support. From one farming community to another, I want to pass on our aroha and support from Mid Canterbury to those up North.

Book of the Month – Mt Somers Library

Title: 'The Prince Rupert Hotel for the Homeless:

A True Story of Love and Compassion Amid a Pandemic'

Author: Christina Lamb

Publication year: 2021

When the UK government decided to lockdown the country because of Covid in 2020, Dame Louise Casey initiated a programme called 'Everyone In', which meant all homeless people were to be taken off the streets and put into temporary accommodation such as B&B's or budget motels. To the surprise of many, Mike Matthews, owner of the four-star luxury hotel The Prince Rupert in Shrewsbury, also put his hand up to receive rough sleepers. Regular guests and tourists had cancelled en masse, and many staff members decided to accept government-funded furlough; it made sense to him to fill the empty rooms of an hotel whose old infrastructure (such as the heating) would not function well anyway when being left unused for weeks on end. Moreover, he figured, it would only be for a few weeks.... Of course, the pandemic and its consequences lasted for much longer and Mike and his two loyal aides, hotel manager Charlie and accountant/jack-of-all-trades Jacki found themselves living in the hotel for months on end in a 'social bubble' with over thirty colourful characters with complex histories and addiction problems. When journalist Christina Lamb came across the hotel team's story at work, she was fascinated by the

compassionate commitment to their new guests and decided to write their adventures down. The result is a feel-good but still realistic account of two extraordinary years in the lives of Mike, Charlie and Jacki, whose ongoing love and care for individuals who have not had the best start in life turns the hotel into a hub from which all of them have the opportunity to leave with a new outlook on life. Or, as rough sleeper Bev explains to Mike: "Being at the Prince Rupert gave me a goal. I got sorted because of you and Covid. Maybe it would have happened anyway but Prince Rupert was my stepping stone" (p. 224).

Of course, many do not get sorted and Lamb is careful to document the mental processes Mike goes through as a carer of people with addictions: from distrust to openness and back. From naive optimism to realistic re-assessment. From disaffected onlooking to compassionate interaction. As Lamb makes clear throughout the book, the homeless crew (whose individual stories we hear a lot about) also affects the team. Not only do they learn how to respond when someone has a heroin overdose or why their guests leave the hot-steaming showers on for ages, they also come to see their guest's lives, and, by extension, their own lives in a new light.

'The Prince Rupert Hotel for the Homeless' is accessible and eventful. Moreover, the book contains a lot of dialogue to bring the hotel and its characters to life. At times, the reader will need to flick a few pages back and think 'wait...who is this again?' There are Mark, Michael, Julie, Hannah, Neil, Simon, Titch and many more and sometimes it is a little challenging to keep track of which life story belonged to whom. It helps, though, that the book contains photographs of the hotel, the team and some of the guests, so there is a bit of visual guidance. All in all, though, the message is one of humanity and kindness and that some are lucky in receiving a lot of it and some are less so. And that it is up to the former to help the latter. Or at least try.

MAYFIELD MT SOMERS ANGLICAN PARISH

Sometimes things happen that are a little bit out of the ordinary. A couple of months ago I was contacted by a descendant of William Spence Peter, who took over the former Gawler Downs Station and renamed it Anama Station in 1882. Her mother and aunt had both died the previous year, one was 92, the other one 93. These ladies had travelled to the U.K. in their mid-twenties and while there had met and married their husbands: one to a Welshman, the other to an Irishman. Home for the younger one was Wales, but the older one with her husband and children returned to New Zealand in the 1980's, and settled in North Canterbury. The first Mr. Peter had purchased about 17 plots in the Mt. Somers Cemetery, but only about three of them had been used, so the children of these sisters thought it would be a good idea to use two of the plots for their mothers. They requested a memorial service in St. Aidan's [Mt. Somers] Church, followed by a short graveside service to commit the ashes to be buried in the Mt. Somers Cemetery. Long before St. Aidan's was built the Peter family had hosted Anglican services in their home, and they were amongst the families who facilitated the building of the church in 1900. It was very interesting hearing all the history of the early days, but the high light for me was finding out that one of the Irish family, who returned to New Zealand, married a descendant of A. E. Peach, whose family owned Mt. Somers Station for many years. It was the father [in England] and aunt [in Canada] of A.E. Peach who donated the majority of the money for the building of the church and in the following year, the vicarage.

I thought it was quite fascinating that two or three generations down the track these two families were united in marriage. What a faith these people must have had, to organize the building of our church in what would have been at that time, a reasonably remote location. Do we have the faith and dedication to keep this Mid Canterbury treasure going in these times when there are so many other more interesting things to do on a Sunday? Let us hope and pray so. After all, it is the only one of the three churches built in Mt. Somers that is still functioning as a church. Blessings, Annette Eggleston

'The way of the Master'

Ephesians 4: v 32 'Be kind and compassionate...forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.'

The writer of this note mentions how that during World War II, when Japan was determined to wipe out Christianity, a test was devised. A cross was laid on the ground and when one suspected of being a Christian was brought before the tribunal he or she was told to walk upon the cross. Those who refused were killed and those who did were freed. The writer tells how he saw one of these cross's when visiting South Korea. It had on it a faint reproduction of the face of Christ – a face that had almost been worn away by the many who had stepped on it. Would it be going too far; I wonder to suggest that when we refuse to forgive, we trample on the cross? Allow me to put it another way; when we refuse to forgive, we bring pain to the heart of our Lord. When nailed to the cross the master prayed: 'Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing. (Luke 23:34) When Tokichi Ishil a Japanese renegade was awaiting the death sentence in a Japanese prison he was given a New Testament and he came on those words. They moved him deeply and brought about his conversion.
