Bricks saved for heritage repairs

The section of brick fence damaged by a car at the Ashburton Domain last weekend was originally built in 1930, to mark the 50th jubilee of the Ashburton Borough.

The brick fence was built in three stages - West Street, from Wills Street to the Curator's Lodge; Wills Street; and the remainder of West Street to Walnut

Police are investigating last weekend's crash and Council will lodge an insurance claim to cover the cost of having the fence repaired.

Infrastructure and Open Spaces Group Manager Neil McCann said the fence had been constructed of bricks made locally at the Crum Brothers brick kiln, which stood as an Ashburton landmark until it was demolished in 1989.

"Staff have rescued as many of the original bricks as they can and they will be used in the rebuild. The next step is to engage a contractor to do the repair and get the process under way."

The Ashburton Domain celebrates 160 years in 2024 and the green space is a key asset for the community and the venue for many gatherings, big and small. Events to mark its 160th birthday are being

fence, following interest generated by the weekend's crash.

Back in 1928, Advance Ashburton was the driving force behind the brick wall project, with the first section built to mark the 50th jubilee of the Ashburton Borough, which was established in 1878.

The wall (referred to as the "brick fence" back then) consists of three separate

• West Street frontage, from Wills Street to Curator's Lodge, was to mark the jubilee of the Ashburton Borough. Plans were proposed in April 1929, work commenced in October 1929 and the job was completed before July 1930.

- Wills Street frontage plans were proposed in March 1930, commenced about July 1930 and were completed January-February 1931.
- Plans for the remainder of the West Street frontage up to the Walnut Avenue corner were proposed in April 1932. Work commenced about June 1932 and was completed by July 1933.

After the first section was complete, the remainder of the West Street span was a mixture of macrocarpa and wire fence, and the Wills Street span was an old unsightly metal fence. Council made sure to only approve plans from Advance Ashburton for the remaining sections of the wall that fit the same style as the first.

Talk it up Tuesdays proving popular with ratepayers

I've been really enjoying the conversations that are part of councillors' regular drop-in chat sessions at the Ashburton Public Library.

Talk it up Tuesdays began a couple of months ago as a trial, with two councillors available Tuesday afternoons and evenings for residents, ratepayers or visitors to the district able to stop by and talk about a burning issue or matter close to their heart.

These sessions have been really constructive and for those who watch the video recordings of our council meetings, you will see different councillors bringing up items that have been raised with them on a Tuesday.

These face-to-face discussions are so valuable and the library venue is a friendly location and easily accessible. It's great to see people supporting Talk it up Tuesdays and coming directly to us, rather than voicing opinions on social media and then seeing the matter spiral

into a negative debate.

I've found the afternoon sessions are better attended. People sometimes just want to chat and tell you about what's happening in their world. Or they share ideas, concerns, compliments and complaints, and some have also provided good feedback on projects that Council has under way.

Subjects raised with me so far have ranged from potholes and roading, to why and how we provide some services. I've also spent time explaining how council works and the difference between operational and governance roles in the local government setting.

Councillors are responsible for setting the direction of the district with policies that promote economic, social, environmental and cultural wellbeing of communities, now and into the future. We are required to prepare long term plans, and annual plans and budgets, in consultation with our community.

Council staff, under the instruction of

the Chief Executive, give effect to these policies and make sure councillors are provided with comprehensive advice and information to make good decisions.

These regular Talk it up Tuesday sessions are also a way for residents to add their thoughts to the mix. Ashburton is lucky to have a wealth of knowledge and experience among our citizens and they all generally want to make our district a great place to live, work, and play.

Your feedback, positive or negative, has been welcomed and passed on through the right channels.

I hope when this trial finishes that we find a formula that will work for all and that these drop-in sessions can continue. Personally, it has been a great experience.

Mayfield Domain flush with success

Mayfield's new public toilets at the Mayfield Domain have opened.

The new four-cubicle block and asphalt frontage has cost about \$277,000 and was built over the past few months to replace old concrete block public conveniences in the domain, which is managed by Council and the Mayfield Reserve and Hall Board.

The domain, off Arundel Rakaia Gorge Road, is a popular pit stop for travellers and tourists on the Inland Route.

Infrastructure and Open Spaces Group Manager Neil McCann said the new block had four modern cubicles, with access for people in wheelchairs, and there were handwashing facilities in each of the cubicles as well as at the end of the building.

"These new public conveniences add to the domain and will be welcomed by all who use them."
