I spoke a couple of years ago against the 30kph limit when it was considered for some areas as being artificially too low for compliance by the majority of road users - and the council members agreed - so 40k was instituted. This was a sensible decision by council. For uniformity 40kph would be acceptable for some areas on the map, but this should only apply right outside the school. A permanent 30k, or 40k limit is not required and would be ignored by the majority - the lower limit should not apply outside school hours, or at weekends and on school holidays. Motorists will NOT comply with limits that are deemed to be draconian and unreasonable . Council member saw common sense at the last review and it is required in this instance. Council must also look at this - is there actually a problem ? If ill considered low limits are placed on streets where there are currently no issues, and no school traffic outside school hours , the disrupted traffic flows with inconsistent speeds can actually create more of a problem than it solves. Common sense is required with this plan
