Its a huge water catchement area, and its unsuitable for farming. The whole area should be forested, as it once was. It should be planted in natives. This will have a number of benefits: carbon capture and storage, carbon credits, possibly honey or wood revenue, water enhancement and lake protection, better recreational and tourist experiences, onflow effects downstream from protected watersheds, healthier rivers and aquifer renewal. It would add benefits and resilience to the whole district.

Here is an important point however: pine trees are terrible for water quality. They acidify and degrade streams, lakes and soil. Reforest with natives as a partnership initiative with the same original species that were once there: Kahikatea? Totara? Beech? First establish a nursery species (kanuka?) and interplant slower growing trees that need the protection.

This partnmership should include the crown, iwi, landholders and businesses and other interested parties, and should options for said parties to benefit, perhaps by sustainably harvesting them at a future point, not saying "You can't fell natives, they belong to Maori." This is a joint venture to benefit all, any profits go towards either recuperating past costs or towards providing further benefits.

High water quality is fundamental to the entire Ashburton

Lakes basin and must be re-established to create a return to acceptable fishing experiences and other recreational pursuits. With the very few fish I have caught in Lake Clearwater this year, I have noticed a significant reduction in their physical condition.

I support the removal of exotic tree species around the lakesides. I would support alternative indigenous enhancement around lake edges.

Use of 4WDs and motorcycles needs to be controlled around lake areas. The lake edges around Lake Camp are a playground for 4WDs and shouldn't be so. The 4WD track around the back (south side) of Lake Camp needs to be closed off to all but pedestrians and cyclists. At present its continued use along with the creation of parallel and alternative tracks is further devastating that swathe of the lake which doesn't make much sense.

Around Lake Clearwater, 4WD and motorcycle tracks off the main DOC tracks are an increasing problem on the fragile soils and vegetation cover.

At the Lake Clearwater village, there should be no increase in the number of dwellings. I support the upgrade and/or replacement of dwellings and don't think that this necessarily increases occupation numbers. Outside of peak holiday periods, bach occupancy is quite low, I estimate 5-10% during weekdays and 30-40% weekends, less during winter months.

Over the summer holiday period the formal caravan/camping area at Lake Clearwater, freedom camping around Lake Camp along with day trips would account for up to perhaps 50% of the total population.

I note an increase in freedom camping with no restraints around Lake Camp. There needs to be controls, e.g on numbers of sites and distance of sites to toilet facilities.

In terms of amenity within the Settlement, I have 2 points:

1. Dust nuisance from vehicles (often speeding) travelling through the settlement, especially Mt Possession Street. and....

2. Children on noisy motorcycles circulating the camp.

Remedies to above:

Whilst the narrower Settlement streets offer less scope for development (and by their nature already afford some traffic calming), that is not the case for the adjacent section of Hakatere Potts Road and Mt Possession Street. NZS4404 is a yardstick for design speeds which can then be achieved through some good urban design. I therefore support an urban design strategy for the Settlement streets but to ensure they still retain their rural character.

For too long, we have paid too little regard to the obvious continual degradation of lake water quality. Hopefully it is not too late to reverse the trend! No doubt the causes are complex as will be the solutions.

As a minimum, Council needs to set and achieve realistic targets to achieve ongoing reductions in concentrations of Nitrogen and Phosphorus in the lake waters. These targets need to be shared with ADC's partners, ECan, etc.

I think it is a great initiative to now be developing a Plan to include best urban design practice, optimum ecological outcomes and best management practices. All stakeholders need to be aligned and supportive.

There are too many private dwellings (180) for the location and insufficient publicly accessible accommodation. All accommodation should meet and exceed principles of good environmental design so as to minimise their impact on the area. Intensification of private dwellings (or expansion) does not seem to be in keeping with the original documents and a plan to reverse the effects of that intensification should be developed. Perhaps the camping grounds need improved facilities to encourage year-round use by the general public. When it is rainy, 5 or 6 creeks go to the lake completely pure water from the mountains, which you can safely drink. But one stream, the largest one, comes from the farm - it is absolute brown water entering up the lake. Bike wheels smell like cows poor for the long time after wheels touched the muddy brown stream up the lake. And have you noticed how much greener fields are on the upper farm? Stop this farm, until the lake suffers badly, like Lake Ellesmere. I also consider there should be some rules about operation of 4wd vehicles and off road motorized bikes close to the lake - these should not probably come close to the lake. The batches should upgrade 100% to the isolated waste systems, but this is happening already as far as I understand until 2026(?), and it was not of the concern recent years, but still should be done in longer term. In the short term, stopping the farm is more important.

It is my favourite scenic location in the whole world. Having been to over 60 countries, there is nothing else quite like the views through, around and in this valley. I value the uniqueness of the village and the fishing huts. The basic facilities and the history make this village unique. As a third generation fly fisherman, I especially value fly fishing for brown and rainbow trout. This quality of this fishing resource has been steadily declining over the last 5 years.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

I have no problem with the huts being upgraded. If they were warmer in winter, they would be used more. The village could be a model village for low energy, high performance buildings, that require little heating. Burning coal should cease and consideration should be given to not burning gas or wood. In saying this however, I understand that fuel is needed for cooking and heating, so either gas or wood are required unless solar / wind systems are upgraded sufficiently to provide the necessary energy for these functions. I don't think the foot prints of any hut should be allowed to be any larger than what is being replaced.

I don't think there should be any additional huts allowed and this will further impact on the fragile ecosystem and the uniqueness of the village.

A thriving Lake Camp & Clearwater should look much as it does today, boating and rainbow trout / perch fishing on Camp and brown trout fishing / windsurfing on Clearwater, but with a return of the quality of the declining fishing resource that the village was set up for in the first place.

I don't think there needs to motorbikes racing around the lakes, or four wheel drive vehicles either. Lake Clearwater should be a peaceful place for walking, fishing and mountain biking only.

I would hate to see the 'lakes' become a tourist village full of luxury lodges. Its location is still not that well known in Canterbury and it is probably better that it stays this way.

We have an opportunity to consider a low carbon future in a location where there is lower carbon use than elsewhere, so minimal further restrictions are needed.

It is still a wilderness area after all.

We are starting to get away from the original intention of the run holders had for creating a village of "fishing huts".

This vernacular should remain at the core of any planning policy for the village.

People are looking to treat this locality like its Wanaka or Tekapo, which it most certainly is not, nor never should be.

A question to ask is what does Lake Clearwater village and surrounds look like in 2050?

Sort that out and put in place a plan or policy to achieve this.

Do you have any other comments?

In the consultation documents there seems to be an inference that human habitation is polluting the lakes, yet the testing data I've seen doesn't support this. What is being done about the intensification of agriculture in the vicinity? Poor water quality and low trout numbers are intrinsically linked. Improve the water quality and trout numbers will return.

This is a unique location and should be granted a status befitting this uniqueness. It should become overdeveloped, but being over protected is ok, if its done with due consideration. For example, the removal of willows from Clearwater, reduces shade for fish and fishermen, while not improving the scenery at all.

As I said above a complete systems approach is needed, rather than isolated targeting of quick fix solutions, that cost money but rarely work.

Members of Save the Rivers Mid-Canterbury Inc. visit the Ashburton lakes frequently and have done so for many years. They have observed the decline in water quality at Lake Clearwater and other Ashburton lakes. Our group has previously raised concerns about the state of these lakes to both regional and local councils.

In the past members have valued the area for environmental, recreational and quality of life values. For generations the lakes have provided a safe place for families to holiday, to appreciate the high-country environment and to enjoy recreational activities such as fishing, boating and wind surfing.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

In making this submission we make no apology for focusing our comments on the fragile state of these lakes, they are the reason for the huts being there and without them there would be no settlement; any plan that focusses on physical attributes of the settlement misses the point, those responsible for protecting the environment of the lakes have failed and as a consequence people who have previously enjoyed the area are now looking at losing the main reason for visiting, the water. The 2021 ban on Lake Clearwater activities after the discovery of toxic algae should be a major wake up call, your statement that you want to ensure the lakes do not 'flip' is acknowledged but there is little in the way of proposals for meaningful action in the immediate future.

It is short sighted to limit a plan to these two lakes. Hut holders and other users visit many of the Ashburton Lakes and so the all of the lakes impact on the values of the area.

Q6

What do you think is holding us back from this?

We are concerned that different interest groups (e.g. ADC, DOC, ECan) appear to have their own 'patches' and that there does not appear to be one group that has overall control of actions in the area. For example, we have had evidence of one interest group being unprepared to comment on key issues relating to the degradation of the lakes because the issues were outside their control. Such an approach contradicts the concept of all groups with recognised interests in this area working together to achieve a positive outcome for all. Save the Rivers Mid-Canterbury recommends that there is a recognised group that co-ordinates and takes responsibility for the implementation of a plan that will lead to the restoration of water quality in the Ashburton lakes.

Top priority must be given to the declining water quality of these lakes. This is the key issue applies to all of the Ashburton Lakes. The fact that all of these lakes are declining is evidence that ADC's focus on the huts only is inappropriate. While we support the removal of long drops, ADC's production of three Courier articles targeting long drops without any recognition of other factors is unfair. The Huts have been there for a long time yet the degradation is relatively recent, other lakes do not have huts yet they are also degrading; it is obvious that there are other factors that are causing the decline of water quality in the Ashburton Lakes.

It must be publicly acknowledged that the main contributing factor to the decline in water quality of these lakes is a result of nutrient run-off from agricultural land. It is not good enough to cite examples of individual farmer actions as indicators of success (this from an ECan letter about the lakes); all land users must contribute in a meaningful way if progress is to be made. The lack of success of current actions was acknowledged in a recent letter to us from ECan but they appear to be unable to make changes to approaches without the time-consuming process of a paper trail. We find this unacceptable, immediate action is required if the lakes are to be prevented from 'flipping'.

The value of these lakes as a sports fishery must be recognised, this is one of visitors' values. The lack of significant spawning water and the stopping of regular stocking has led to a decline in the fishery. This needs to be addressed.

The importance of these lakes for birds, particularly the Southern Crested Grebe, needs to be acknowledged and goals to protect their habitat put in place. This includes predator control and the need to keep established water edge trees.

Do you have any other comments?

While a 30-year plan might be relevant it must be recognised that the condition of these lakes is so fragile that short-term high priority goals relating to water quality must be identified and implemented. Even the time to put this plan together is time that is lost if actions are not taken immediately.

I am aware that the Council's Commercial team are trying to establish a memorandum of understanding with the hutholders and this could clarify responsibilities and roles. As new matters arise it would constructive if the three organisations could easily communicate with an executive group and possibly with remote meetings as required. Other organisations and parties may need to be included from time to time, for example wilding tree management which also includes the other neighbouring landowner Mount Possession Station. The Council as the manager of the Lake Camp recreation area needs a clear and decisive policy regarding freedom camping at the lake and the types of other recreation that are allowed there. Is it appropriate for people to camp there overnight? If so, how should this be managed? Is it OK for motorbikes and 4WD vehicles to drive around the lake or should it be walkers and bikers only? Would the Council invest in improving the walking/biking track around the lake with more native plantings on the southern side of the lake to enhance the track and the lake amenity?

I value the range of activities that are available at Lakes Camp and Clearwater and in the wider Hakatere Conservation Park. These include tramping and exploration of tracks and the lakes, with fishing a family focus at Lakes Clearwater, Camp, Emma and Emily. The separation of activities at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater allows for motor boat activities at Lake Camp and the quieter wind and people-powered activities at Lake Clearwater. Other pursuits I enjoy include photography and painting. I am an artist and enjoy having the opportunity to sketch and paint village scenes, local landforms, outdoor activities such as my partner fishing and flora such as tussocks and Matagouri. I use pastel pencils and Acrylic paints for sketching while at Lake Clearwater, but at home can focus on larger Oil or Acrylic paintings of landforms and outdoor pursuits.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

A thriving future will maintain the character of the existing baches, while upgrading the toilet systems to reduce any potential impact from long drop toilets. Lakes Camp and Clearwater become lovely meeting places for holiday makers and long term bach holders, especially at holiday times such as Christmas/New Year, Easter and other holiday weekends. At other times bach owners enjoy the quietness of being in the outdoors, engaging in activities such as fishing, tramping, kayaking, wind-surfing, skating and hunting. The health of both Lakes Camp and Clearwater is paramount in order for outdoor pursuits to continue.

While there are some baches that could be more accurately described as houses, in general, the bach character of the village is predominant. Bach owners also put time in the village to good use in carrying out maintenance work, both in individual dwellings and around the village. Conservation work by bach holders in the Hakatere Conservation Park includes removal of wilding pines, Rowan seedlings, weeds, and restorative planting of indigenous species. Care is taken to prevent the occurrence of fire outbreaks in the village, by provision of additional water storage for firefighting and keeping down the height of grasses and other vegetation. A number of hut holders are involved with fire brigade responsibilities.

Q6

What do you think is holding us back from this?

My main concern is the health of the lakes in the area, which has an impact on outdoor pursuits. Lake Camp can be impacted by vehicles that break up the ground when the water level is low. Lake Clearwater has deteriorating water quality, with increased growth of weeds, bacteria and algae leading to lack of water clarity. It is no longer possible to see through to the stones and pebbles at the base of the lake. Fishing has become more limited, and windsurfers face the possibility of skin problems through contact with the lake water. Lakes Roundabout and Emma are also demonstrating decreasing water quality. The land around these lakes demonstrates a focus on fertilising for increased production, without necessary safeguards for management of water runoff.

The wider Hakatere Conservation Park with the Ashburton Lakes is a taonga for New Zealand/Aotearoa. The recreational activities are varied and exciting and need to be accessible for all. Maintaining the health of the wider catchment area with the lakes and high country environment needs to be a focus for Ashburton District Council and for the wider Environment Canterbury area. A balance is needed between the needs of the farming, recreational and conservation communities. Māori and Pakeha express concerns around the health of the area. Meeting the needs and values of all of these groups is a high priority requiring consultation, collaboration and understanding.

"Thriving" is a word often used to describe city life. This is the antithesis of what these lakes are about for many of us. This area is one of the diminishing number of accessible places to escape from fractious metropolitan life, and continues to be a precious psychological retreat for many.

Further "development" should be curtailed to prevent overuse and loss of the essential value of this serenity.

No further Bach sites in this crowded village.

Limitations on motorbike/RV use in and around the village to reduce damage to ground and sound pollution. Underage drivers should be responsibly supervised or excluded from driving on public roads to reduce risks of injury.

Actively encourage campers to pay their fare share of maintaining the campsite rather than expecting the ratepayers and a select few regular campers to subsidise their stay. Also prominent signage to prohibit washing in the lakes.

To help protect the native life (e.g. Grebes, Geckos etc) and control animal faecal contamination particularly at the lakeside, the sensible ban on dogs should be extended to include cats.

Actively working with DOC and Ecans and the local farmer to seek a meaningful reduction in farm effluent's effects on eutrophication of these lakes.Delay here could be disastrous for the whole community in and around the lakes, and rapidly become irreversible. Lake Clearwater should remain limited to fishers, swimmers, paddlers and windcraft.

The green verges around the lakes should be preserved. No new sealed carparks, and strict limitations on the return of tour buses into the village and campsite area, where their vehicles are disruptive and their numerous visitors can misuse and swamp the limited toilet facilities.

Both my husband and I have been coming to this area since we were children. It's remoteness and unique natural landscape make it incredibly special to us and our extended family. We typically come off-season so that we can enjoy the peace and tranquility. We particularly enjoy walking, mountain biking and fishing as we are conscious of treading lightly on this precious whenua.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

Critically - a thriving future would involve regenerating the lake water quality and associated ecology to a level which is once again healthy and self-sustaining. With fresh water mussels naturally filtering the water, and native bird populations growing. This is paramount. These lakes were here before any human intervention, and they will be here long after. They have a natural balance which our human interventions have knocked out of kilter and it is our responsibility to work together (for as long as it takes) to restore this balance. This does not mean removing all human settlement and inhabitance, rather - ensuring that our presence in this landscape benefits rather than degrades it further.

I believe that as visitors, hut and landowners - we do not have 'rights' to use this place, rather 'responsibilities' to care for it. We owe this to the roto, whenua, and the iwi for whom this is their turangawaewae. Any plan that is developed should support and build from their rights as kaitiaki, and the te ao Māori concept of whakapapa (interconnectivity of all things). This world view is inherently regenerative and provides an important foundation for us to rebuild a healthier relationship with this precious natural environment. Considering the current and rapid degradation of Lake Clearwater I do not believe the area should be considered for any greater density or development. I believe that activities that currently threaten the health of the lakes should be phased out - such as out-dated sewerage

systems, top-dressing of neighbouring farms, and access to motor vehicles around Lake Camp. Lake Clearwater should remain noaccess to motorboats.

Whilst I don't support greater density in the settlement - I do believe that the plan should consider and develop amenity to support appropriate levels of camping in and around the lakes. These should be priced to offset the cost of regenerating and maintaining the landscape. I support and applaud those who have begun work replanting natives, noting that this takes time, effort and perseverance in this landscape (my efforts have always failed!).

It would be great to see further outreach to campers and hut owners around the precious and precarious balance of this natural environment - as we have perceived a shift over time in the way the lakes are used (and abused) in particular a significant rise in the use of motorbikes and motorboats.

Q6

What do you think is holding us back from this?

There are many competing interest in this area. It will be an impossible task to keep all your stakeholders happy, however at the end of the day the ultimate stakeholder is the land itself. The lake 'flipping' is its last cry for help.

I think you will need stronger regulations and control around surrounding land use, in particular access for motorized vehicles and farming activities within the lake catchment. There is clear historic evidence of water quality decline following top-dressing. Please have the bravery to see past short-term concerns, gripes and politics, and have the vision to create a plan that prioritizes long-term environmental benefit. This may not be the popular choice in the short-term - but it is the only choice if we wish to continue to enjoy these lakes.

I believe 30 years is too short of a timeframe for this plan. Although the lake has taken less than a generation to 'flip' - it will take many more to return to health. I encourage you to take a multi-generational view of how to regenerate this special place.

Although currently based in Auckland, both my own and my husband's families have cared for land in the Ashburton Lakes catchment for three generations. We were married on the shores of the lake.

I currently lead environmental catchment regeneration projects focused on multi-stakeholder collaboration.

I am opposed to any further subdivision for buildings.

I acknowledge the pressure from day visitors and campers which must be catered for with areas set aside with toilet facilities provided but the inevitable growth in demand must be met at various sites in the Ashburton Lakes area not just the Clearwater/Camp village.

Visitors often comment on the village amenities and the "pristine environs" but there is little understanding of the collective voluntary input of the hutholder community that maintains it.

I support the retention of the current council leasehold arrangement and ask for pragmatic rules consistently applied to all leaseholders appropriate to our village rather than rule based city norms. There are good international examples of holiday villages built on small sections with similar pressures to Clearwater.

Please do not seal the road from Hakatere and no reticulated electricity.

I see no place for tour buses within the confines of the village.

This is a holiday village not a place for permanent residents. The council has an opportunity to set out rules for development to retain and enhance our "special village character"

I support the current minimal provision of refuse disposal options. As difficult as it is, we must continue to develop an ethos that if you bring "stuff up" you can take it back home to properly managed landfill or recycling sites.

Disposal of vegetation is more difficult but again for most hut holders the volumes are manageable to take home.

Guidance could be provided to hut holders on suitable planting on sections and list noxious plant species including but not limited to conifers, lupin and rowan.

Keep up the good work on wilding pine control. There are plenty of volunteers keen to continue helping with this ongoing problem. Please continue to support the dog ban and add one for cats to protect our native species.

Clearwater has a nationally acclaimed reputation for high wind sailing. Please retain our grassy rigging area for this and other passive water based activities.

Support protection of our "night sky" by providing guidance regarding permanent outdoor lighting.

People broke the locks anyway. Now there is no lock and the paper road access to the lake outlet has become an eyesore with roads all over the place with deep undriveable ruts. All vehicles esp 4 wheel drivers who only want to drive not walk have had a field day. This needs to stop. Solutions: 1. lock the gate again, 2. create a proper road to the lake outlet-not beyond

B) The lake outlets base has been worn down. The water did not use to flow out like it does now. A foot bridge was built for walkers but vehicles seem to think they can just plow on through without seeming to notice the damage they do. People should be discouraged from going across in vehicles. It is not a proper road and the outlet continues to be gouged out: 4 wheel vehicles go particularly fast without any consideration. Fishermen, hunters, walkers and trampers all want peace when out on the lake edge and in the hills. Its not much fun sitting at your bach and hearing the roar of motorbikes across the lake, nor is it fun walking around the lake and being passed by loud motorbikes and 4 wheel vehicles. If we are going to be serious about addressing the environment and looking after it then this needs to be addressed.

Solutions: 1. Ban 4 wheel vehicles and motorbikes from the far sides of both lake camp and clearwater. 2. Ban vehicles going across lake clearwater outlet- this will go some way to retaining the water in the lake. 3. Create a car park by the water outlet. 4. Build a bridge across the outlet so the lake outlet/river base is not destroyed further.5. Build/expand a motorbike park in the area adjacent to the current bmx tracks. This will help keep people from the lake edges and away from the village streets, it could reduce the noise pollution a bit.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

The future of the area is in the balance. Water quality in Clearwater in particular has deteriorated alarming in the past decade, no doubt due to excessive N and P.

Clearwater is now eutrophic and any further deterioration can see the lake become hypoxic due to severe algal blooms and can lead to firstly, impaired reproduction of fish plus the deaths of fish and other vertibrates and invertebrates.

Water testing 2008 showed that Lake Clearwater was eutrophic however over the following 5-6 years the water quality improved.

However the downward trend in water quality became apparent leading to the lake being eutrophic for the past 6 years. Any further deterioration in water quality will be catastrophic.

As pointed out by Owen Nuttridge, Lake Alexandrina suffered similarly in the 1980's but positive action such as the total cessation of agricultural top dressing within 500m to 800m of the shore and tight restrictions on local agricultural fertiliser use plus other measures has improved the water quality substantially.

The Clearwater settlement is highly valued the way it is. Bach owners and visitors love the simple character of the area. No further baches should be allowed in the area.

Mains electricity is not required and the lack of mobile phone coverage is welcomed.

Freedom camping should be closely monitored and volunteer campground hosts could be used over peak periods to ensure the environment is respected.

Motor bikes should be banned from the area or severely restricted due to noise polution and environmental degradation.

Q6

What do you think is holding us back from this?

A definitive plan is ungently required to address the water quality issues. A report was recently published that was prepared for the Department of Conservation and Environment Canterbury. "Updating CLUES Nutrient Load Predictions For Ashburton Basin and Waimakiriri High Country Lakes May 2021.

This report concluded that Clearwater required a large reduction (66%) in total phosphorus and moderate reduction (33-66%) in total nitrogen are necessary.

Water quality can only be improved once it is ascertained where the source(s) of N and P are. Piezometers have been recently been installed in the Clearwater settlement area and one would hope that a substantial number of similar devices are installed around the lake including the southern side of the lake and the headwaters of the lake.

The should identify to main source(s) of the N and P and thus positive steps can be taken to substantially reduce these nutrients. In repeat of the other aspects of the future of the area the ADC

30 year plan is a very positive step but adequate funding will be of paramount importance to expedicously complete the plan and begin implementation ASAP.

The area is our 'happy place', a place to get away from stress, to be outdoors and therefore is awesome for mental health. We enjoy the lake boating, water skiing, kayaks, fishing, etc as well as the land for walking, MTB, views and enjoyment of the clean natural environment.

However what my wife and I really value the most is the community. It's a place where we can involved or if we chose, be alone. There is a sense of community that a small group of shelters and mixed occasional residents creates. The feeling that the big outside normal world is separate and its social status/income/background is irrelevant. At the lakes all are equal, visitors are welcome and hut holders are our community, not just neighbours.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

A thriving future will look much the same as now. The density and character should remain the same. No development in terms of growth should happen. Growth would put additional pressure on the already stressed environment.

What do you think is holding us back from this?

To sustain and improve the quality of the Lakes area will require some modifications to some activities.

Environment

1) The plan needs to encourage all users to respect the environment and the water quality in the lakes.

2) The bach settlement area was gifted to the community and therefore cannot be disposed of or sold by ADC. The hut holding community appreciates the assets they have in an environmentally sensitive area and in return respect it (mowing public areas, pick up rubbish, remove wilding pines, improving toilets, etc). The bachs patch is adequately managed, is naturally improving and it's future is secure.

3) The surrounding land however, including the lakes and surrounds, needs greater protection as the Hakatere Conservation Area is currently classified by DOC as 'stewardship land'. It's got protection under the Conservation Act however could be reclassified and disposed of if it was considered no or low conservation value. It seems unlikely it could ever be considered low or no conservation value however the 30 year plan should support it being reclassified from stewardship to being part of the conservation park and one of specially protected areas classifications of conservation park, watercourse area, etc. The additional protection may assist with improving and maintaining the water quality in Lake Clearwater.

Water quality

1) The plan should address water quality.

2) Scientific testing of all water sources should be undertaken, not only focused on mid lake and on the bach settlement as it appears to currently be. If the adjacent farm land is the major contributor testing of the incoming streams, swamp and subsurface water into Lake Clearwater and Lake Camp from near the farms should prove it.

Camping

1) The plan needs to put restrictions on the freedom camping areas as its spreading.

2) There's limited accessible shoreline along Lake Camp for boat users and day visitors so no camping in day access and picnic areas at western end of Lake Camp i.e. in front of the aquatic club, swimming area and grassed areas 200m either side of the boat ramp i.e. keep it accessible to all users

3) No camping on southern side of Lake Camp. Recently campers at eastern end of Lake Camp have been setting up further south and due to distance have not been using the existing toilets in north east corner.

4) It's not unusual, particularly weekdays, for freedom campers to outnumber the people using baches. The environmental effects of the freedom campers cannot be ignored and need to be considered in the plan as the campers are significant users of the area however unlike the bach community are not active in the maintenance or preservation of the area.

5) A paid ADC employee should visit frequently to administer, control and clean up after the freedom campers. It should not be a bach owner role to do this. ADC could consider, similar to Waitaki lakes, a daily or season camping charge during peak periods to cover costs for the extra rubbish, cleanup, control of behaviour, etc.

Toilets

1) Provide toilets at western end nearby but not immediately beside ski club, swimming area or grass picnic area. Do not want the smell in those recreation areas. The area behind the trees is suitable (where there were long drop toilets until recently).

2) The recent ADC enforcing removal of long drops has been a good move. Many baches (most?) had already converted to holding tanks however it needed council regulation to remove the remainders.

Services

1) The simple life is a large part of the attractiveness of the area. To be inviting the area needs to be different than urban areas. The plan should not propose urbanization, or the return to complete wilderness.

2) The limited services (telecommunication, electricity, lighting, etc) are an important part of keep it simple and therefore attractive to visit and stay. Keep it the same. Do not want street lighting, mains electricity or a sealed road.

Future of Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater

Baches

1) As per the current district plan no more sections or new baches are to be built.

2) Maintenance, replacements and improvements or extensions of existing dwellings are acceptable to make them more comfortable for visitors, to reduce maintenance, to improve sustainability etc. The sections sizes naturally restrict the buildings. Each should be unique so allow resource consent applications where they fit the individual bach site utilistation.

3) Do not develop a plan where they must be a certain style, minimum roof pitch etc (example Hanmer Springs).

Rubbish

1) Increase the rubbish skip collection frequency during peak times. Need more skips along Lake Camp shoreline as the skips overflow at peak camping times.

Recycling

1) Provide recycling bins. A high portion of the rubbish could be recycled. Sadly many visitors do not stop in the recycling facilities at Mt Somers.

Lake use

Keep motor boats on Lake Camp. On lake activities are central to many day visitors and hut holders. It would decrease the number of visitors if motor boats not allowed and would increase the pressure on already overloaded Lake Hood.
Keep Lake Clearwater for passive non meterised sports.

2) Keep Lake Clearwater for passive non motorised sports.

Land use

1) Block 4wd access around the southern side of Lake Camp. Most 4wd owners are responsible however a few percent are not and there have been many new tracks formed in the last 12 months. The new rougher tracks are encouraging hard-core 4wd users to cause further damage. The land will take years to recover.

2) Provide a dedicated 4wd and motorbike area so they have an area to play in.

Dogs

Future of Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater

I would like to compliment the ADC Open Spaces Department for their achievements at the Lakes Reserve. The new toilets at Lake Camp are a great asset and the plantings of locally sourced natives are significantly enhancing the area.

In the past few years the road has been maintained to a higher standard which improves the trip to the lakes.

I also appreciate the work done by the council to remove pest animals and a large number of the mature pines that were the source of wildings around the area. But this job is not finished and there is a need to find other ways to create shelter without using weed tree species. Trial plots of shelterbelts containing Kanuka, broadleaf, etc could be set up.

Although there are fewer wilding pines on the north side of the road along Lake Camp than in previous years, there are still some appearing (seen 10 March, 2022), and a number of Silver Birch seedlings are also growinging over the fence on the DOC land. I suggest that all trees along the north side of the road be removed as they are randomly self- seeded and also shade the road in winter when frost or snow can cause a hazard. A careful survey of remaining Pinus contorta around Lake Camp may allow removal of more of these trees that produce wildings so easily while leaving some shelter.

There are a number of other weeds growing within the settlement which cause considerable nuisance value on DOC land. The greatest concern I have, is the appearance of Russell Lupins in the Hakatere Conservation Park. Forest and Bird members have spent hundreds of hours over many years, removing other weeds, but during the last year we have found Russell Lupins for the first time, as well as seeing them growing around the huts in the Clearwater Village. There is no evidence that the lupins in the Conservation Park are connected with those at Clearwater, but the ecological damage they have caused in areas like the Mackenzie Basin serves as a warning to the potential disaster they pose. One large infestation was near the South Branch of the Ashburton River and was dealt with by Forest & Bird members.

ADC can help prevent the spread of lupins by banning them from the Lakes Reserve and spraying any that are growing there.

Photographed around the huts area.

There is a very significant bird nesting area between Buicks Bridge and the Blowing Point Bridge. Threatened birds species, Blackfronted Terns, Wrybill and Banded Dotterels, all nest there and colonisation of this area by Russell Lupins would cause serious problems as they compromise the braided character of the river as well as providing cover for predators such as stoats and feral cats. Preventing the spread of lupins from the hut settlement and into the sensitive conservation land is crucial.

Other exotic plant species around the huts, particularly Rowans and Cotoneaster, produce brightly coloured berries favoured by birds which are spreading them over conservation land. Removal of such plants around the huts could be compensated for by the council providing suitable native species to replace them. Ideally the council will carefully inspect all planted areas around the huts, remove weed species and then restrict all plantings to locally sourced natives. Making information available on the reasons for weed removal and suitable replacements would help.

Another weed growing beside the camping ground toilets:

Stinking iris • Weedbusters

My other huge concern is for the quality of the water in Lake Clearwater. That it has been allowed to become so polluted and in danger of being permanently degraded, is a source of shame and embarrassment for the Ashburton District. I urge the council to do everything within its power to prevent the lake from 'flipping' including working with other agencies (ECAN, DOC, LINZ). There is considerable urgency in dealing with the remaining long drop toilets and I appreciate that the council has finally acknowledged the importance of this to the health of the lake and the South Branch of the Ashburton River which is connected to it.

Other submitters mention their appreciation of the 'peace and quiet' of the area and the area is one favoured by many local landscape artists.

The nuisance of motorbikes and four-wheel drive vehicles is also becoming visible on the land. The wet area below drains into the south-east of Lake Camp and to see it becoming a 'mud plug' has consequences for the water quality in the lake as well as leaving scars, that in this environment, take many years to heal. These vehicles are also creating similar landscape scars in the Hakatere Conservation Park. Wheel tracks remove cover and open the ground to colonisation by weeds.

Wheel marks beside Lake Camp.

I am hoping that the appointment of a Biodiversity Officer will result in ADC staff learning a greater appreciation of the fragility and significance of the lakes area and the surrounding environment and this will result the encouragement of the public to view the area as an ecological and scenic toanga, not a place to scar with wheel marks and trash by leaving rubbish.

I value the tight knit nature of the settlement, both in physical terms and the community that develops around bach ownership. I like the fact that working bees still work and things get done by the community itself without having to rely on outside help. Restricting the built environment means that the space around the lakes is uncluttered, very open, often exposed, but with plenty of things to explore and do.

These places to explore are "self-motivated" - meaning you have to want to explore the country around the lakes - there is no-one guiding you to do it.

I value, particularly, the nature of the built environment - which often has been undertaken by bachowners doing minor repairs and developments. These should require building permits - but the overall settlement pattern, where baches have been gradually improved by their owners does create a very unique environment.

As above, I value the fact that Lake Clearwater is not dependent on power, internet services, telephone, and water reticulation. It teaches and aids us all to be very aware of what we use, and how we use resources. That should remain a primary focus. However it cannot come at the expense of people not exercising care on their property to preserve these qualities - through good sewerage management, and care in the way that they use vehicles, boats and bikes, so as to not damage, the fragile lake environment.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

As stated above, I like the density of the settlement - and do not want to see it expanded. but the density of the Lake Clearwater and Lake Camp has been the major change to the settlements over the last 15 years. Previously 1 bach was probably owned and occupied by one family. Now it is not uncommon to see several boats parked up, a number of bikes, and several cars, all at the same bach. We're no different in this regard but the "density" of how baches are used has changed significantly. This means that in order to maintain the same thriving nature of the community, people need to take their own responsibilities to look after their water, their waste, and their physical occupation of the land.

Weed growth in the surrounding landscape also concerns me. I see broom, for example, gradually taking hold in some of the streams, and I'm concerned that this will take off, if left uncontrolled. DOC needs to implement a programme to control land-based noxious weeds. We as bach users will do our part, around the settlement and even further afield, but it needs to be matched with a surrounding landowner contribution.

I see the settlement thriving a culture of self responsibility for your own needs at the lake.

However, this does raise an issue of how campers deal with their human waste. I don't see much pollution or rubbish around the lake but it is the stuff that I cannot see that worries me as more and more people freedom camp -

A thriving settlement will need to control these effects by sufficient toilets and directions to not camp outside designated areas. Lake Clearwater also has heritage value, in its overall layout and built environment. It is a feature that is highly valued by visitors to the area. It is characterised from an early emphasis on the fishing in the area, to a more holiday area. This character needs recognition to control the built environment. Density can do that. But it probably needs more oversight to ensure that all built environment is in character of the overall settlement. I do not think that this should be controlled by a colour palette. The village stands out, as it always has. It's character is not defined by trying to integrate with the surrounding landscape. Rather it is a small settlement, defined by an eclectic range of colours, and small structures, side by side.

What do you think is holding us back from this?

all baches need to have adequate, unpunctured, holding tanks, that are emptied regularly - perhaps requiring this to be once per year.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

For the area to thrive, the water quality of Lake Clearwater, in particular, must improve.

This must be the top priority and focus of 30-year planning for the area, and must be committed to by ALL stakeholders - ECan, ADC, iwi, landowners, DOC, LCHHA and bach owners, and other users of the area.

No further bach development should occur at the Lake Clearwater settlement nor surrounding environs. Site density at the settlement is clearly set out in the Ashburton District Plan. There should not be any changes made to those provisions: they are fit for purpose and take into account the special character of the bach settlement, infrastructure constraints, and importance of the surrounding environs.

The settlement is already 'bulging at the seams' over the summer, with the influx of bach users, campers, caravans and motorhomes, visitors to the Hakatere Conservation Park and day-trippers. Any further density and associated pressure on very limited infrastructure would only exacerbate the issue we face with deteriorating water quality.

The character of the Lake Clearwater baches is special and should be respected and protected - it is a fantastic example of a post-WW2 holiday fishing settlement. Kiwis' innovation, hard work and love for the outdoors have resulted in a colourful cluster of 180 baches, entirely 'off the grid', and where there are now third generation family members looking after their family treasure!

A thriving Lake Clearwater and Lake Camp means we all look after what's there, we don't let it grow any further as it won't be sustainable, and we continue to ensure that it's a wonderful, safe area that can be enjoyed by many.

Q6

What do you think is holding us back from this?

Getting to the bottom of what is causing the decline in water quality of the Lakes, and taking appropriate actions to mitigate and stop further deterioration is holding us back from ensuring a sustainable, thriving future for the area.

Apart from that, the Lakes area is already thriving - the baches are well cared for, an enormous amount of volunteer effort goes into maintaining the public amenity, and many, many people enjoy visiting the area and largely look after the environment respectfully. There is a fantastic sense of local community, bach owners act as excellent stewards of the area, and there are constructive relationships between the various stakeholders involved in the area's future.

Varies - from between 2 - 3 times a year, to monthly. Normally stay 3 - 10 days. Have owned bach for 52 years.

What do you value most about the area?

The whole suite of ecological and geomorphological features that make up the Clearwater Basin. It is an outstanding landscape with its glacial history writ large.

The lakes also tell the history of the glacial advances and retreats, with many being formed as a result of large blocks of ice breaking off from the glacier, and slowly melting, whilst loess blown from the mountains blew past to form the plains. There are amazing forest remnants with ancient trees, e.g. ti kouka and totara.

We are fortunate in having a large landscape with lakes, kettlehole tarns, wetlands, and rivers that can be explored all close to the Clearwater village.

I especially value the big sky, the views to the mountains, the norwesters, the very small plants, and the vast openness.

Probably about 48 weeks of the year, it is a very quiet and restful place to visit (except for weekends).

I appreciate the huge efforts put in by people over recent decades to try to rectify some of the damage from past poor decisionmaking, e. g. wilding conifer removal, pest control, removal of willows, getting rid of the old dumps, and upgrading long-drop toilets.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

A place where both Councils, iwi and the Department of Conservation are working together to ensure the place is returned to a healthy and thriving landscape - addressing water quality and reducing pests and weeds (including planted). Restoring the native vegetation, and providing important habitat for the secretive and/or small species that thrive there, from small plants, lizards and aquatic life, to marsh crake and crested grebe.

The meaning of Te Puna a Taka that I have been taught is that it is a large spring and/or upwelling of water. I've paddled on the lake when it has been like glass, with D'Archiac mirrored perfectly over the bow. I can see down through the water to springs welling up from below. At the head of the lake I see the glacial sediments, and the stream flowing in from the wetlands above. Giant tussocks and matagouri provide important habitat and help improve the water quality. Small streams come off the lateral moraine slopes to the north. This is Lake Clearwater - beautifully and aptly given its Pakeha name, with its Māori name, equally as compelling.

When I visited and saw the thick peabrown soup that was the algae, I was personally devastated. I had been coming to that place for over 50 years and never seen it like this.

A thriving future for this place is one where the mauri of the lake and its surrounds is returned.

The discussion document doesn't make a single mention of the major change that has occurred in the upper catchment - particularly in the last few years. That of the significant application of fertiliser on land that feeds those waters flowing into the lake. The waterfowl haven't changed much (although control of Canada geese is important), the bach owners have been progressively improving their wastewater systems (though more should and could be done), and significant efforts have been made to reinstate the wetland at the end of Mt Possession Street to better filter the water, as well as restorative planting around the larger wetlands, e.g. Lambies Stream. Old dumps, where we used to lift the lid on the ground and rats would stream out, have been closed.

Unless that critical issue of water quality deterioration is addressed - quickly, bravely, and across ALL the statutory bodies with the capacity to do so - then we have failed. It would be unforgiveable given what we now know.

As for the village, it should remain a small, off-the-grid settlement; reached via a well gravelled road, and well-cared for by the local bach holders.

Camping should be better managed, including designated areas, no "parking up" of caravans for months on end, and good contained toileting and shower facilities (to stop people using the lakes to wash in).

Building footprints should only be a certain percentage of each site, and there should be height restrictions on any new build and/or upgrade.

No more building on unbuilt sections. These should be used for camping facilities. No additional sections. It should remain as a leasehold situation, but leases should be secure.

There should be plant list of what can be grown on site so that there are no further weed problems (I remember bach owners gaily planting out the lupins, rowan trees, and a myriad of terrible douglas firs along the road).

Lake Clearwater should remain free of motorised craft.

The island on Lake Clearwater should be restored to its full suite of native plants - retaining trees for shag roosting, etc.

Motorbikes should not be ridden around the settlement (including on tracks between the phone booth and playground), nor around the lakes or forming their own dirt tracks on high value conservation land.

Children should not be allowed to ride motorbikes around the settlement as it is against the law.

Support the ability for 4WDs to have some access around Lake Clearwater, as is.

Stop 4WDs and motorbikes from going around Lake Camp (vehicle access should be stopped at either end and the ends should be used for water recreational access as is now).

Regular compliance needs to be enforced in the settlement, as one or two families arriving up can really spoil it for the few, e.g. motorbikes circling the settlement round and round; 4WDs ripping deep tracks around the southern side of Lake Clearwater, and exceeding the speed limits.

A few years back someone proposed a tennis court in the then-treed area behind the back of the phone booth. At a discussion of the hutholders it was agreed that we had plenty of recreational opportunities in the area, and didn't need to bring in more infrastructure to create more opportunities. In other words, let nature be the playground, and let us respectfully spend time in that space without destroying it.

What do you think is holding us back from this?

Councils need to look more widely than just the settlement and recognise the impacts of land use and the application of fertiliser on the water quality of the lakes.

Council needs to work immediately and collaboratively with ECan, DOC and iwi to ensure solutions are ecologically sound and restore the mauri of the place, particularly the water quality.

Council needs to ensure activities are properly managed throughout the site.

Council should not allow any more sites to be built upon, but should allow for the remaining sites to be either part of a formalised campground (with campers paying their fees), and/or restoration to ensure better water and riparian quality.

Council should consider installing recycling facilities, and ensure contained toileting and wastewater systems. The ones partway along Lake Camp are a vast improvement on what was there before.

Areas need to be strongly designated free from motorised use, and enforced across all agencies. The slow creep evident (e.g. tracks up onto the DOC land where it says "don't drive", and dirt bike tracks created by Lambies Stream) should be nipped in the bud

immediately. That requires monitoring, compliance and enforcement when needed.

Biodiversity investment should be made by Councils and DOC.

Support the continued use of interpretation panels to help tell the story of the area.

Its important to recognise that the pressure of significant numbers of people tends to occur only during certain periods of the year. Most of the time the settlement is a very quiet place, and its common to be one of less than a dozen bach-holders present at the time (especially during the week). Weekends can be busier.

Managing the summer and holiday pressure points are where most of the work is needed with respect to people and place, e.g. toilets. campground control.

Please support the continued ban on dogs. The presence of dogs would change the settlement entirely. Much of the wildlife in the area is ground dwelling or close to the water's edge, and dogs would be very disturbing.

A thriving future will look much the same as now. The density and character should remain the same. No development in terms of growth should happen. Growth would put additional pressure on the already stressed environment.
What do you think is holding us back from this?

To sustain and improve the quality of the Lakes area will require some modifications to some activities.

Environment

1) The plan needs to encourage all users to respect the environment and the water quality in the lakes.

2) The bach settlement area was gifted to the community and therefore cannot be disposed of or sold by ADC. The hut holding community appreciates the assets they have in an environmentally sensitive area and in return respect it (mowing public areas, pick up rubbish, remove wilding pines, improving toilets, etc). The bachs patch is adequately managed, is naturally improving and its future is secure.

3) The surrounding land however, including the lakes and surrounds, needs greater protection as the Hakatere Conservation Area is currently classified by DOC as 'stewardship land'. It's got protection under the Conservation Act however could be reclassified and disposed of if it was considered no or low conservation value. It seems unlikely it could ever be considered low or no conservation value however the 30-year plan should support it being reclassified from stewardship to being part of the conservation park and one of specially protected areas classifications of conservation park, watercourse area, etc. The additional protection may assist with improving and maintaining the water quality in Lake Clearwater.

4) Wilding pines are a problem. The bach owners last year had wilding pines removal as part of a community fun event and collected 500+ wilding pines in just 1 hour. We're going to do this yearly on top of the individuals doing pines removal most weeks. Water quality

The plan should address water quality. Scientific testing of ALL water sources should be done. Focus seems to be mid lake and on the bach settlement. If the adjacent farmland is the major contributor test it. Test the Lake Clearwater incoming streams and swamp.

Camping

The only camping around Lake Camp to be in a designated area. No camping south side of Lake Camp and around the boat ramp and ski club. The area is needed for day use.

This past Christmas there was people camping in front ski club and in day picnic areas where there are no toilets. It left no space of day users to enjoy the area and they were toileting in the trees, leaving toilet paper and rubbish that the bach owners needed to tidy up. The quantity of rubbish in 3-4days overflowed the skips along mid Lake Camp. It's a cost the campers should contribute to. Camper should pay for staying along the lake.

Campers frequently outnumber the people using baches. The environmental effects of the freedom campers cannot be ignored and need to be considered in the plan as the campers are significant users of the area however unlike the bach community are not active in the maintenance or preservation of the area. A paid ADC employee should visit frequently to administer, control and clean up after the freedom campers. It should not be a bach owner role to do this. ADC could consider, similar to Waitaki lakes, a daily or season camping charge during peak periods to cover costs for the extra rubbish, cleanup, control of behavior, etc.

Need more skips along Lake Camp as the skips overflow at peak camping times.

Toilets

Provide toilets at western end nearby but not immediately beside ski club, swimming area or grass picnic area. Do not want the smell in those recreation areas. The area behind the trees is suitable (where there were long drop toilets until recently).

Improve the standard of the Lake Clearwater campground toilets.

Provide a tank/toilet empty for the Lake Clearwater campers and the baches using portapotties

Services

The simple life is a large part of the attractiveness of the area. To be inviting the area needs to be different than urban areas. The plan should not propose urbanization. Limited services are an important part of keep it simple. Keep it the same. Do not want street lighting, mains electricity or a sealed road.

Baches

As per the current district plan no more sections or new baches are to be built.

Maintenance, replacements and improvements or extensions of existing dwellings are acceptable to make them more comfortable for visitors, to reduce maintenance, to improve sustainability etc. The sections sizes naturally restrict the buildings. Each should be unique so allow resource consent applications where they fit the individual bach site utilistation.

Do not develop a plan where they must be a certain style, minimum roof pitch etc (example Hanmer Springs).

Recycling

Provide recycling bins. Mixed recycling like everyone does at home. Lots of people put there recycling in the skips rather than take it to Mt Somers on way out.

Lake use

Keep motorboats on Lake Camp. On lake activities are important attractions. Keep Lake Clearwater for passive non motorised sports.

Land use

Block 4wd access around the southern side of Lake Camp. Most 4wd owners are responsible however a few percent are not and there have been many new tracks formed in the last 12 months. The new rougher tracks are encouraging hard-core 4wd users to cause further damage. The land will take vears to recover.

Future of Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater

Provide a dedicated 4wd and motorbike area so they have an area to play in.

Dogs

An ADC person should visit to control dogs. Most days in summer there are dogs. Often from cars parked right beside the big no dogs sign. If we approach them the normal response is abuse. It's easier to ignore the dogs than be abused. Some dog owners have no respect for signs because they know there will be no consequence.

I mostly value the wide open spaces to wander at will in, away from the pressures and noise of industrial civilization- and having a bach to return to in the evening! The lakes themselves are jewels in the landscape: The mountain reflections on a still morning or evening are spellbinding.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

A thriving Lake Camp and Clearwater would have:

1) Courtesy amongst all users, and stricter rules from Council so as to keep unnecessary machinery noise to a minimum. The special nature of the locality is its natural peace and quiet. The vast areas of the developed parts of NZ can have its noise- why bring the machines here? and why allow for their near unrestricted use?

2) Extensive native plantings through all the land that Council manages/owns i.e. the settlement and the Lake Camp surrounds, in keeping with the appropriate species for the area.

3) Lake water quality that makes your heart sing! and the fishing lines tighten!

4) A thriving intermontane basin ecology on the lands that Council owns/administers.

5) A Council that takes full responsibility for all ecological weeds within its land holding here, including the wilding pines that spring up on adjoining private land and public conservation land, spawned from the trees around Lake Camp.

6) A settlement that is not subject to ever taller and larger dwellings (I can hardly call them bachs).

Q6

What do you think is holding us back from this?

It has become usual for children and young adults to blat around the streets on motorbikes and quads with no regard for other visitors. There need to be clear signage and bylaws forbidding such behaviour. It really ruins my visits: I try to avoid weekends and school holidays, or if I can't I head out for the hills from dawn until dusk so as not be subject to such antisocial behaviour.
Vehicles/quads/motorbikes should be forbidden from driving around the shores of Lake Camp: There is a need for signage and bylaws. Yes I appreciate this sounds like rules rules rules. But a significant minority are ruining for everyone else. These days it is all about 'me', and the only way is to have signage and rules that are actually enforced! I think an honorary paid officer needs to be appointed from the community at the lake over summer and during holidays so that there is actually some enforcement of the required new rules.

3) The declining state of water quality of Lake Clearwater is incredibly distressing. Once the lake 'flips' it can NEVER be restored, and it is heading that way fast. Every other high country lakes' declining water quality is due to farm inputs in the lake catchments. To pretend that just at Clearwater this is not the case and that it must be the septic systems beggars belief- yet this is what some folk are saying. I have photos over the last 13 years that document the green spread of fertilised hillsides on the south side of Clearwater. Council should front up and make the case for national funding to buy out the farm or to subsidise it to much reduced inputs. A coalition of ADC, Fish&Game and Forest&Bird (with DOC and NIWA support) should make a proposal to government along these lines. I would call the state and trajectory of Lake Clearwater a national tragedy.

4) I understand that the Hakatere Basin floor was formerly clad in open mountain toatoa, thin-barked totara and bog pine. Not a skerrick of these species is now present on the basin floor. Council have the opportunity to help restore this lost ecology in conjunction with DOC around Lake Camp, and to test ever better ways to get such trees established.

5) The lovely old bach-ville that was once the settlement is rapidly changing to suburbia, which is a great shame. The settlement needs its very own rules in the district plan, that impose size and height limits to new builds/rebuilds, and confines them to one storey.6) Broom and wilding conifers are the greatest weed threats to the Hakatere Basin, with others such as rowan and elder emerging. There is a lack of an effective weed strategy for Council administered/owned land at the lakes that deals with these threats effectively, with an understanding of the seeding cycle and soil seedbank potential of each of these species. The strategy will also need implementing!

Our extended family has been associated with and coming to this area since the late 1930s and in turn Bach owners from 1947 to now. We currently visit every couple of months for two to five days including an extended period over Christmas / New Year.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

A thriving future at the Lakes needs restored water quality of all the lakes in the Ashburton Lakes area. Protecting the environment and the natural character of the land are fundamental to thriving future at the Lakes.

There are a number of key actions required to have a thriving future in this area:

- Implementation options for improved management and protection of wetlands in the area.
- Protect remaining indigenous biodiversity.
- Pest control (flora and fauna).
- Managing land use intensification, irrigation and nutrients.
- Controlling wilding trees and Spaniards.

Water quality and biodiversity

Lake Clearwater was once internationally renowned as one of the best fish 'spotting' and Dry Fly-fishing lakes in the world due to its exceedingly clear waters and slightly raised, mostly obstacle free perimeter topography (i.e. few trees), all of which, apart from the now questionable water quality, is still very much intact. Past farming practice of the surrounding area was for low intensity farming comprising mostly of sheep, though some cattle grazing also, with minimal enhanced pastures. Preserving and restoring the natural character of the lake edge and surrounding DOC land, along with restoring water quality in the Ashburton Lakes is fundamental to having a thriving community which is enjoyed by both locals and visitors.

One must wonder what has changed that has degraded water quality so much for Lake Clearwater but not to the same extent that of Lake Camp. With Bach owners addressing the sanitary issue through the installation of toilet holding tanks the focus now needs to shift to other sources of nutrients in the catchment to help improve water quality in the Lakes. Ongoing importing nutrients into the catchment is likely to be problematic.

There are other drivers of environmental degradation in the area. Sediment discharge into the lakes and destruction of fragile fauna by motorised vehicle use is obvious. New 4-wheel drive, quadbike and motor bike tracks are appearing regularly. Driving vehicles through the lake edges is clearly detrimental to the land and the water. Restricting off road vehicle / motorcycle access to designated established tracks; but prohibited around the back of Lake Camp would be an easy way to limit the damage.

Natural character

The call to plant trees around the lakes perimeters requires careful consideration, to existing trees and any future development / selection of species. This topography was and is open tussock country. There is no evidence of historic forestation within this area, other than some select stands of Mountain Beach in pockets as the land will not generally sustain tress. This area is a harsh climatic zone for trees. Before any attempt at introduction of trees in the area Extensive research and consideration are required into the types of fauna that were present prior to human intervention. Research may show that not all trees will be successful either around the surrounding lakes zone and or within the local community. Introducing randomly selected species of indigenous and or exotics, without understanding possible negative biodiversity environmental impact / nor ensuring appropriate biodiversity gains, is surely unwise.

The natural character of the area is also likely to be put at risk if additional residential units were to be made available. Maintaining the landscape value of this significant area is important.

Other matters of importance:

• Use of local knowledge: There exists within the community an accumulated knowledge base in keeping with this area, that

certainly has value to the future direction of the zone. Utilise it!

• Effective local drainage: There is a clear need to mitigate excess groundwater seepage water through the few affected baches / sections on Mt Possession St, between lakes Camp and Clearwater, during high Lake Camp levels and associated severe and or sustained rain events. This is likely to require additional drainage to be installed and maintained by Council.

•

• Freedom camping: Freedom campers should be restricted to official camp sites. These sites need to be complimented with improved waste management and toilet facilities.

• Keeping the village feel: Retention of the bespoke village atmosphere by respecting and building upon the community input that underpins the locale.

Q6

What do you think is holding us back from this?

There are a number of key actions that need to be taken to make progress:

- Investment
- Progress scientific investigation
- Political leadership
- Management of road transport and tourism demands

Funding for improvement in local facilities, fencing ecologically sensitive areas, pest control and ideally for retiring land within the catchment will be required to make progress on effective land management and to work towards a thriving future.

More scientific investigation into a water quality degraders, natural heritage (historic flora) and appropriate pest control techniques (flora and fauna) will be required to build a strong understanding of the key issues and develop effective tools to manage issues. Lack of monitoring / measuring Nutrient, Nitrate and Phosphate amounts entering the water ways and catchments of the lakes in the zone from all sources is holding back progress in the area.

Slow-moving bureaucratic process over the past 15 years to solve Water degradation and environmental issues. I draw your attention to the 'Ashburton Zone Implementation Programme' 2011 and wonder how much progress has been achieved too now. Strong political leadership is required to make progress on these issues. Too many invested interest-factions has 'stagnated' progression in solving these issues. Vested interests seem to be preventing logical conclusions to be drawn. Again, strong political leadership is required to enable the best outcomes for the community to be found.

Negative impact on the roading infrastructure, including within the Bach zone, of multi axel tourism transport. Including excessive speed and the dust storms generated by these heavy transport vehicles when negotiating roads through the community, especially so on Mt Possession St.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

Firstly immediate action to ensure Lake Clearwater is cleaned up and returned to live up to its name - "Clearwater".

To ensure all bach holders adhere to the ADC's request for holding tanks in working order (without holes in them) so as to protect Lake Clearwater.

Preserve the character of the settlement. A place families can go and live off the grid and appreciate a simple lifestyle and the natural beauty. Dwellings that allow parking on the site for at least one vehicle if not two.

The 12 vacant sections remain vacant never to be leased because the section at the end of Two Thumb Street is used by many visitors and hut holders as a viewing space to look over Lake Clearwater and gives walking access to the lake other than the road. Dogs are never allowed around the bachs or Lake Camp.

There are many unwritten rules that hut holders have known to be important to retain the uniqueness of the area especially the respect of the area and other's bachs and land area around them. An example is when we bought our bach 37 years ago we were told by the lawyer it was our responsibility to keep the trees (pines) trimmed on our boundary (the west boundary trees now partially removed). Recycling be available as many take home what they take up to the lakes but others see the skip bins as a place to put anything in them. (Some campers even putting rubbish down the toilets beside Lake Camp.) Camping around Lake Camp to be restricted to certain areas and regular chats with campers by ADC representatives (especially in busy times) so as to share the expectations of ADC in allowing them to freedom camp in the area. An honesty box fee system may work to support the cost of this. The leases ask that hut holders do not have any exotic trees or plants growing on their sites and ADC check sites and ask for the removal of any exotic plants currently there. (Lupins are a growing concern and silver birch wildings are west of the hut area. The future would be to retain the natural beauty of the area.

Q6

What do you think is holding us back from this?

I was surprised to read on the ADC publication that you quote "four wheel driving" as being a popular recreational activity in the area and would like to know where this is to take place. Does the ADC see the four wheel drive area being around Lake Camp and in the water when the lake is at a lower water level?

The use of motorbikes around Lake Camp needs to be restricted.

By saying four wheel driving is a recreational activity you are implying anyone is allowed to four wheel drive anywhere on DOC land. In the past most people respected the right to four wheel drive around the lakes to access fishing. Now there are many four wheel drive tracks being formed in DOC areas spoiling the natural beauty.

Do you uphold the no dog bylaw?

There is a phone number to ring when dogs are at Lake Camp and when we rang you gathered a lot of information re the caller but we are unsure if anything happened as the dog was there for the rest of the day, swimming in Lake Camp.

The rubbish bins don't encourage recycling and many bottles and other recyclable materials are going to landfill and the ADC needs to do better with this issue.

The ADC are the guardians of a unique area of land gifted many years ago in good faith and this needs to be upheld and respected and it may take problem solving and effort, but many hutholders are committed to this and we acknowledge it takes cooperation and on going communication with the organisations you are currently working with. We congratulate you on asking for feedback, but to be genuine it needs to be acknowledged and the voluntary work that already takes place to ensure the area remains unique is acknowledged and many do this in their own way individually and without anyone knowing.

It is hard to uphold respect and values especially of areas and the environment but it takes leadership and sharing of the expectations the ADC has of the area when allowing hut holders, campers and daily visitors to use the area.

On going consultation and open meeting opportunities for individuals to meet and hear or be informed of developments and decisions that are made in respect to the Lake Camp and Clearwater area is important.

Some individuals do not belong to the committees or groups you meet with but work hard for the area and have a long and invested interest in it for the last 60 years and their families will into the future well past the next 30 years.

Certainly there needs to be no more bach development and dirt road access and no power should remain - doesn't need to be another Lake Wanaka.

What do you think is holding us back from this?

Free camping facilities along Lake Camp have been detrimental. Little respect from the people using these facilities in terms of rubbish and bringing dogs etc. No issue with the camping itself but they should be charged as user pays and better oversight of what goes on. Historical development of bach housing is an issue as plenty have gotten away with no adherence to building code or district plan - which isn't right however seems unfair to apply those standards to others now. Perhaps some more tolerance around e.g. site coverage before requiring a resource consent. And charge extra rates to those who have exceeded their section and/or site coverage.

100% support the removal of long-drops from the settlement but believe it is tenuous at best to infer they have caused the water quality issue in Lake Clearwater. Poor water quality is already evident in the tributaries feeding the lake - there needs to be better oversight of the surrounding farming operation. Has intensified in areas over the last 40 years in terms of stock and fertiliser application. This must occur or the lake will be lost.

Finally, careful consideration needs to be given to any plan to include grey water retention from the settlement huts. Most huts wouldn't have the room to put in the larger tank size required and getting these emptied regularly and cost-effectively will be a real issue.

The water quality of the lakes. In the past fishing and swimming were regular activities and the lake needs to be returned to a pristine state so these activities can continue without any problems.

The fact that our bach is an early bach that has been owned by family for a long time. It has been preserved to maintain the historical way of the original baches at Lake Clearwater.

The recreational facilities provided by the lakes especially swimming, boating, fishing, and ice skating in the winter.

The spectacular Two Thumbs range and the many places where you can tramp on day excursions or longer trips.

The bach community - people from the community always ready to help out - this was demonstrated during lockdown when some went beyond their duty to ensure that all were safe and had all they needed.

The village is a safe place for young families and young children and we would like to continue to foster this. Children are encouraged to do outdoor activities through community run events and they learn valuable skills for their future. Some children have gone on to win national titles.

It is particularly relaxing for the older generation. There are many communities within the village that cater for a wide range of interests - native plantings, fishing, walking, water skiing.

Keep dogs out. It should also be expanded to include NO cats. We have witnessed cats that have been brought up by campers and then dumped, they have then become feral. They endanger the rare birds and skinks. They are a huge problem on the Rangitata with the vulnerable ngutuparore (wrybill) and the critically endangered skinks in the Ashburton basin area.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

The natural environment is critical to a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater.

The poor water quality of the lake in the Ashburton Basin catchment. The eutrophic condition of Lakes Clearwater, Emma, Denny and Roundabout, and the deteriorating condition of Lakes Heron and Camp and the Maori Lakes. This is something that has happened in the last few decades and coincided with the beginning of aerial fertilisation of the farmland in the lake catchment. Lake Clearwater especially will not recover unless the level of fertiliser and stockage of animals in the catchment is reduced. There is extensive New Zealand and International evidence for the eutrophication effects of fertiliser application on lakes and rivers. This is a well known fact that has not been addressed in the past. The potential future impacts of climate change will only aggravate the problem.

The nutrients, from fertiliser application, are also impacting the plant life of the wetlands associated with the lakes, which are a major mitigating factor against climate change. They are also an important sink for greenhouse gases, where carbon is stored and prevented from entering the atmosphere. If not the biggest, it is one of the biggest wetlands in New Zealand and it should be given greater protection.

We want our Lake Clearwater area to continue to function as a place where bach owners, campers, caravaners, and day visitors enjoy passing through, playing, discovering, enhancing, and exploring by all groups associated with the lake working together and continuing to provide a positive stewardship of this area.

Education is important for future generations. The area is a resource for every school in the Ashburton area that at present is not utilised. It fits in to the science and environment curriculum where children are encouraged to learn about their natural environment and how to maintain this for future generations.

The components of environmental education are: Awareness and sensitivity to the environment and environmental challenges

- Knowledge and understanding of the environment and environmental challenges
- · Attitudes of concern for the environment and motivation to improve or maintain environmental quality
- Skills to identify and help resolve environmental challenges
- Participation in activities that lead to the resolution of environmental challenges

Bert Hofman (Open Spaces Planner) has helped coordinate planting and a bioblitz for the local school at Mount Somers along with DOC, Forest and Bird, ECAN, and Fish and Game. This enabled the students to gather a greater understanding of this precious area, an area they are all growing up in, helping them learn to protect and manage it sustainably.

It is important not to increase the current size of the settlement for two main reasons

- (a) The pressure on the environment, the lakes and the land.
- (b) Climate change and the risk of fire.

The village should remain off grid. Provisions need to be made for electric vehicles. A charging station could be located at Mount Somers or the possibility of a generating plant using solar panels and the wind could be explored.

Provision of a wifi system that can meet the demands when the village is busy would be a bonus in this current day and age.

Campervan waste and rubbish. A waste disposal unit should be sited away from baches and from the lakes and toilets. This should be a site outside the village so campervans and caravans can empty on the way in or out of the village. Recycle facilities also need to be provided. Skips full of recyclable materials is impacting on climate change and we need to take greater responsibility in this area.

Future planning should prevent the development of large inappropriate mansions on bach sites. The present village ambience and character should be maintained.

What do you think is holding us back from this?

We are confident that the village will continue to thrive as a much-loved settlement, where families come to experience and enjoy the natural environment and all that it offers as long as all future planning takes into account -

- Actions put into place to restrict the use of fertiliser, and stock number, in the catchment of the lakes and rivers so that the water quality can be returned to its pristine state.

- Climate change is at the forefront of any future planning both for the natural environment and for the development of bach sites.

- That all groups associated with the area work together, communicating and talking about protecting the future of this area.

- That protection is put in place for all the land currently under the Department of conservation in the area, maintaining and enhancing the current environment.

- That the village is kept to its present size adhering to the rules in the Ashburton District plan.

Ashburton District Council should continue rabbit culls, and should facilitate the trapping of possums, stoats, weasels, ferrets, wild cats, hedgehogs, rats and mice to allow the endemic plants and animals to return to the area in greater numbers.

To Continue to provide the support for the elimination of wilding and weed plants and to further enhance the area with locally sourced, endemic plantings. Use of natives should be encouraged as an alternative to pines for wind breaks and also for carbon sequestration.

Tourist buses should be prevented from passing through the village and stopping. They are noisy, create dust, and often leave engines running close to baches. They provide unnecessary congestion and there are other places for them to view the lakes. Tourist buses also create damage to the roads.

Keep Lake Clearwater quiet- "A Noise free zone" sail boats and windsurfing, No motors in or around the lake. This protects the birdlife Australian crested grebe, scaup, coot, and also the flora - the native orchids, gentian, rare native brooms and many other small plants from damage.

Keep Lake Camp for motor boats, motor bikes and quad bikes.

In the holiday times there can be noise issues from visitors. There should be control over motorbikes and quad bikes use in the village and on the adjacent DOC land. More provision needs to be made for motor bikes and quad bikes so they can enjoy their sport away from the village and stop them creating further deterioration of the DOC land.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

We would like to see an area with minimal development which restricts the scale of new builds and renovations so that the area retains its current character and appeal. Users should be able to continue to utilise and enjoy the area. There should be a focus on making sure users can continue to enjoy the area and activities available rather than drive users away or encourage more. The current numbers and facilities work well although improvement could be made designating spaces for different users. The current separation with motor boats only being allowed on Lake Camp should be maintained. Designated spaces for users such as Motor bikes could be developed to reduce conflict between different user groups. Camping needs to be managed and kept at a level which the area and facilities such as toilet and rubbish can maintain. Current vehicle access for fishing around Lake Clearwater works well for the most part although improved access for those with mobility issues should be considered. Its important that the facilities and environment can sustain the number of visitors and users. Current walking, running and cycling facilities are great and could be further developed which allow users better access without negatively impacting the area. Conservation areas should be developed but this shouldnt be at the expense of users, both can work well side by side, its about finding the right balance as the users can be the biggest asset in maintaining the area.

What do you think is holding us back from this?

There seems to be a reluctance to allow users and conservation to exist together, too often it's a one or the other approach. This often comes from a vocal minority taking over rather than working with all user groups. There appears to have been some work done on water quality in recent times, unfortunately this doesn't seem to extend to a good understanding of the future impact of changes already made, for example many longdrops have been retired and fertiliser hasn't been applied close to the lake for many years yet it may take many years for the impact of these positive changes to be observed. Its important this work continues so that there can be focus on making the right changes.

Over a 50 year period I have observed a steady decline in the quality of Lake Clearwater. This is due in large part to the impact of 4WDs crossing the lake outlet. This has been crushing the natural stone bar across the lake outlet where the stream is crossed. This has lowered the lake outlet and thereby contributed to lower water levels and quality.

Q7

Do you have any other comments?

Since the 1990s when cheap imported 4WDs arrived in NZ, the numbers of 4WDs being used around Lakes Camp and Clearwater has steadily increased. When the Hakatere Conservation Area was installed I was disappointed that DOC didn't ban all vehicles from crossing the Lake Clearwater outlet. My father (91) is adamant that there used to be a shingle hump at the outlet that limited outflow. This has been completely eroded and scoured out by 4WDs driving across the outlet over many years. This has contributed to lowering lake levels, leading to increasing lake temperature through summer, with knock-on impacts to the fishery, and greater likelihood of algal blooms and other water quality issues.

Since the removal of the plantation and wilding pines around Lake Camp, that area has also become a 4WD and motorbike playground and has been badly eroded and scarred as a result. This area is supposed to be under the management of Ashburton District Council.

The botanical Society highly value the diversity of the ecosystem types, the high number of plant species, lizards and invertebrates, the rare ecosystems (ephemeral tarns, alluvial outwash, scree), the tussock basin with few trees (the continued impact of the last glaciation the vegetation patterns) and the right to roam through the DOC Hakatere park.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you? What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

We feel the health of the lakes are paramount. All future building or management of the catchments must be subservient to the water quality of the lakes. We wish to see the hakatere area retain its"High Country" wilderness feel with no increase in built up areas by concentrating housing around homesteads and batch communities. We feel the Hakatere basin will retain its visual essence if it remains a batch community and does not morph into permanent housing(as happenat Selwyn Huts or continues to grow (as is underway at Castle Hill village)

Sewerage disposal is a natural limit on the number of batches in the community. We applaud the move to pumped sewerage to remove the chance of sewerage reaching the lakes.

It is a privilege to holiday in such a natural environment. Without conscious effort the weeds will spread ("on average in NZ a naturalised plants takes 40 years to become weedy" Prof Philip Hulme

https://www.rnz.co.nz/national/programmes/sunday/audio/2018643664/philip-hulme-nz-is-one-of-the-weediest-places-on-earth). Control on garden plants today will reduce the weed burden in 40 years time. We suggest a consent condition for future building permits is a stipulation that landscaping is to be limited to locally-sourced plants. DOC and Council Public areas should lead the way. b. All wilding pines must be killed now

The 2020 Government budget invested \$100 million dollars in controlling wilding pine spread. The outcomes decrease the cost of future conifer control, reduce fire risk, and prevent indigenous biodiversity being smothered by the spread of a closed conifer canopy. We believe it goes against national interest for Ashburton Council to retain a shelter belt of Pinus contorta for shelter for visitors. We suggest that shelter be built and the remaining Pinus contorta be removed as soon as possible.

c. Ban planting weeds on the National Pest Plant Accord (https://www.mpi.govt.nz/dmsdocument/3664-National-Pest-Plant-Accordmanual-Reprinted-in-February-2020-minor-amendments-only) and work with bach holders toprogressivley remove plants that are weeds of high country tussockland, wetlands, and braided rivers (Russel lupins, rowan, cotoneaster, willows, sycamore, scothc broom). c. Declare the bach community a Dark Skies reserve

Ban night LEDs and unsheilded lights. There is now scientific evidence that LEDs at certain frequencies disrupt moth life-cycles. The number of moths in tussockland is in decline (Cass Field Station reference).

d. Support a Quiet Park movement (https://www.quietparks.org/)

Sound travels far in the clear air unimpeded by forest. The aural assault from quads, moto-cross bikes, jet-skiis, outboard motors, petrol lawn mowers can ruin a weekend. Living close together requires restrain and courtesy for neighbours.

e. Work with all landowners to limit motorised vehicles to formed roads and farm tracks from leaving formed tracks.

(4WDs, motocross,side-by-sides, Cam Ams, quads) make ruts through wetlands, up steep tussock hillslopes remain for decades.

Weeds get a foothold in the disturbed ground. Driving on a lake bed or down a riverbed is environmental vandalism.

f. Make it a "not cats" settlement

The predation of "holiday" cats on lizards is a risk to the long-term viability of lizard populations and ground-nesting birds.

Ō tū wharekai and the Lake Camp/Otautari and Lake Clearwater/ Te Puna-o Taka area is one of the most outstanding, relatively unmodified vistas.

The area has high geological, recreational, ecological and cultural value. The area represents one of the best inter-montane wetland systems that makes up an interconnected system of Lakes, emphemeral turfs, streams, wetlands and bogs.

The species present include native fish and eel, threatened birds including: the bittern, wrybill, banded dotterel, tern, grebe and tarāpuka; lizard species, numerous threatened plant species, and of course the dominant red tussock and carex grass. The area has great significance to Takata whenua, particularly as a historic mahinga kai and resource gathering area.

For these reasons the most valuable part of the area is maintaining and improving the ecological health of the catchment.

What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

A thriving future is where Papatūānuku thrives: Te ora o Papatūānuku | Healthy nature, Te hunga Atawhai | People who care, and Te ora o te Hapori | Thriving communities. This in practice would look like a community with low ecological impact, maintenance of existing character or sensitive growth and enhancement, Whānau, hapū and mana whenua being able to practise their responsibilities as kaitiaki of natural and cultural resources, and community invested in the protection and enhancement of the environment.

A lack of a funded long-term and codeveloped future management strategy for the entire catchment. The ongoing issues related to water quality and increasing nutrient load. What does a thriving future at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater look like to you?What do you see for the density and character of future development (if any) of the area?

A thriving future at Lake Camp and Clearwater means people being able to enjoy the great outdoors in a stunning setting. Whether that be relaxing and enjoying the magnificent scenery, walking, running, mountain biking, all forms of water sports or fishing. All of these activities occur within a beautiful, slow moving and tranquil setting. This is the appeal of Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater. Yes, all the above activities can be undertaken in so many other locations throughout New Zealand. It is the simplicity of the area that sets it apart. We do desperately want to preserve and protect it, but in a manner that maintains its simplistic character. Baches need to be updated for various reasons. However, when is a Bach no longer a Bach and now a luxury holiday house? Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater has traditionally been a settlement of Baches. This is how we hope it might remain. It is tricky because no one wants to limit how many people can enjoy this amazing location but yet as more and more people visit or stay at Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater the greater the impact on the environment. With absolute certainty no further Baches should be allowed in the area!

Q6

What do you think is holding us back from this?

For many years the Ashburton District Council has not been keeping a close eye on Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater, many rules and regulations have slipped.

We worry the ongoing management of Lake Camp and Lake Clearwater could become a political situation where problems are pushed round and round in circles between all parties involved and nothing is achieved quickly. To ensure change happens one party still needs to be the governing body and hold greater responsibility.

Do you have any other comments?

There are obviously a million suggestions as to what could be done to start improving and protecting the area. Listed below are just a few thoughts:

- Should camping around Lake Camp be allowed? Perhaps camping should only occur within the Lake Clearwater Camping Ground, therefore naturally reducing numbers and the fire risk.

- Enforcement of the 'No Dog' policy. How can this be patrolled and enforced?

- Should motorbikes and 4-wheel drives be allowed off the shingle roads at all? Another option is separate areas created for mountain biking and motorcycling/4-wheel driving. This is the case in Wanaka and it works well. The damage motor bikes and vehicles are creating at the back of each lake with rut marks is significant.

- Based on the piezometer test results to place piezometers near suspected problematic Baches to pin point where groundwater contamination may be occurring.

- Should any further sleep outs be allowed as this increases guest numbers?

- To ensure all Baches comply with new gas regulations eg: gas bottles not inside, gas pipes rather than hosing that deteriorates with age, gas monitors in every Bach.

Our Bach is midway along Mt Possession Road. We are extremely worried about the height of Lake Camp and the damage this is creating to some properties on Mt Possession Road.

The abnormally high level of Lake Camp at present means there is currently a much greater volume of water travelling underground from Lake Camp to Lake Clearwater. This high water-table has led us to discover a fault in our effluent holding tank. The tank has been removed and the toilet not in use, but the tank cannot be replaced until the water levels drop. It is like trying to hold a basketball under water.

The underground pressure created by the high water-table, means that when someone empties their effluent holding tank there is the potential it could 'pop up" and possibly cave in or crack and begin to leak. Such a tank will then contribute to groundwater contamination. The liquid waste companies say this is a very common problem.

The high underground water level must also be creating other structural damage. For us personally this is our greatest concern at the moment.

The outlet for Lake Camp is a very small culvert. This water then flows down to Lake Emma which has a proper river as an outlet. We believe the Lake Camp outlet needs to be significantly enlarged to allow the lake to drop and help subside the volume of water passing underground from Lake Camp to Lake Clearwater. If there are any concerns about the lake dropping too much then perhaps a gated system to control the outlet could be used. Another option could be a large underground pipe from Lake Camp to Lake Clearwater, also gated if required.
