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CBD primed for Christmas cheer

The Ashburton Silver Band and the Ashburton MSA men's choir will be adding their music and voices to Light up the Night on Saturday 25 November, when Ashburton's giant Christmas tree comes to


East Street is planned to be closed between Havelock and Tancred Streets for a night of Christmas cheer, including Christmas carols and yummy treats from food vendors.

The Christmas tree, which will be assembled in the CBD in the next few weeks, will be lit up at 9.15pm.

Ashburton Mayor Neil Brown said lighting up the Christmas tree signalled the start of the festive season and the event would be great fun for all the family.

"People might like to bring along their deck chairs and a blanket, and sit in front of the stage that will be beside the tree. It's great to see the silver band and the MSA choir joining the occasion this year, and of course there'll be Santa and his elves there too."

The Samoan Christian Congregational Church choir from Ashburton will also be singing Christmas songs and carols, and the local Life Dance Academy will be performing. The Mid Canterbury Children's Trust will run activities on East Street, in a building kindly provided by



Redmonds, and the Balloon Man will also be working his magic.

The event starts at 6pm and people will be able to buy from nearby food trucks catering to a wide range of tastes, from hangi food to noodles, mussels and tacos. There will also be coffee carts and donuts.

Eco Educate will be onsite with a waste station to encourage people to recycle; they are also urging people to bring their own clean containers to hold food.

Mayor Brown said Council had talked to retailers in the CBD following the 2022 Christmas festival and moved the tree lighting from a Friday to a Saturday, so it would cause less disruption to trading.

"The roads are planned to be closed to make it safer for everyone to enjoy the night, and there's plenty of parking off West Street and on side streets.'

> The Light up the Night Christmas festival also includes a family movie night on Saturday 9 December, at the Ashburton Domain picnic ground, off Elizabeth Street. The movie has not been announced yet, but it will begin screening at 7pm.

The Regent Cinema is supporting the Ashburton Youth Council by providing two popcorn machines on the night, churning out free popcorn, and food trucks will selling other goodies.

The night is free but movie-goers will be asked to bring a canned food item that will be donated to the Salvation Army's community foodbank.

SANDBAG SAVVY

Did you know that you can use a pillowcase as a makeshift sandbag? Sandbags don't have to be filled with sand, you can also use any fine material, including soil. Only fill the bags to half or two-thirds full, as this gives the sand room to expand. If you're caught in a pinch, pillowcase sandbags can be used to divert water away from your house or to block doorways, drains and other openings onto properties.

GULL CONTROL

Operations to reduce populations of the Southern Black Backed Gull are currently under way in the Upper Rangitata and lower Ashburton/ Hakatere River (between Smalls and Croys Roads). Warning signs will be erected the Department of Conservation and Ecan, who are running the operations, at each site. Southern Black Backed Gulls are known predators of threatened braided river birds like the banded dotterel and wrybill.

Tony Todd - Councillor **Three Waters reforms need** everyone on the same page

We are expecting a National-led **Government to repeal the Three** Waters legislation (or Affordable Water reforms as they are now known) within its first 100 days.

But this will not be the end of water reforms, because we all want to make water better for everyone.

The difference in future reforms is that we will be part of the journey and Council will retain ownership of the drinking water, wastewater and stormwater assets that we have worked very hard to maintain and renew over the decades.

We are told that the Affordable Water legislation will be gone by Christmas and with both National and Act campaigning to repeal it, that seems very likely.

In its place will eventually be reforms that are more palatable for Councils like ours, and that have widespread public support and bipartisan support in the House.

Our Council is among 30 Councils, from the Far North to Waimate, that belongs to Communities 4 Local Democracy, and we all want to retain meaningful control and influence over the assets that our communities have bought and paid for over many generations.

Three Waters is always a subject of great interest at Council meetings and Activity Briefings, and I have learned a lot about what happens to ensure clean, safe water comes out of my tap, or what happens when I flush my toilet. I now also know about sludge that results from Rakala's wastewater treatment process, and about the membranes that now microscopically filter Methven's drinking water.

Millions of dollars are spent each year on improvements to our three waters services. Right now, Council is installing new UV treatment systems on some of its deep water supplies and putting in special monitoring bollards around the network to make sure water quality is consistent, no matter where you live.

We are making good progress building a membrane water treatment plant at Mt Somers, a smaller version of the new one that now serves the people of Methven, and we are drilling a second water bore for the people of Rakaia.

Much effort goes into Council's core day-to-day services, and also the seasonal ones, like the Christmas events that are making their way onto our agenda. The giant Christmas tree will soon be making its presence felt in the CBD and will be lit up on Saturday 25 November.

Council will also hold a Family Movie Night on Saturday 9 December. The community is wholeheartedly invited to attend this free screening of a Christmas classic, and bring along a can of food for the Salvation Army's community foodbank.

It is definitely time to spread some cheer.

Stock up before move, readers urged

Book worms are being encouraged to fill their bags with books before the Ashburton Library closes for three weeks on Sunday 26 November ahead of its move into a new building.

Library Manager Jill Watson said library users might like to borrow a few more books than usual and any issued this month would not be due back until 10 January. The new building opens on 18 December.

"We know the move is going to cause some disruption for library users, but we're really excited about the new space we're going to and all the new activities that will be available."

The new library is over twice the size of the current building and includes community meeting spaces, a performance space, makerspace, a learning lab with computers, and a sound studio

The makerspace includes new equipment like a vinyl cutter, laser cutter and craft cutter. There will also be standard and heavy-duty sewing machines, and an overlocker.

Computers in the learning lab will be equipped with headsets, controllers and games, and in the children's and young adult library there will be a PlayStation 5 or Nintendo Switch.

The library's move to the new civic and library building, Te Whare Whakatere, is a big logistical exercise involving relocating

over 60,000 books.

Ms Watson said the free public Wi-Fi would still be available outside the old building during the three-week closure.

"We've decided to keep the free Wi-Fi available because we know some people rely on that connection. You'll need to be parked or seated nearby the building to connect."

For those with a library membership, the library's digital resources will still be available during the shutdown, with a big selection of e-books, audiobooks, music, videos and more.

Ms Watson said last weekend's heavy

rain had caused flooding issues in the building, and the library was closed on Sunday so things could be dried out.

"We are really looking forward to being in the new building, where we won't have to worry about leaks."

The library will be closed for three weeks from 4pm, Sunday 26 November, before reopening in the new building at 8.30am on Monday 18 December.

Council is partnering with Ri Ra Events to run the biennial awards, and Ri Ra marketing director Colm McGrath said he was delighted with the level of interest in the 2024 awards.

"The objective of the awards is to celebrate business success in our region. We have to credit ANZ and our category partners for helping us to promote and scale the event. With the extension, there's still some time to enter and we're encouraging all business in our region to do so."

He said businesses could enter multiple categories.

"The most popular categories so far are Excellence in Retail and Hospitality, Emerging Business and Excellence in Customer Experience."

Other popular categories were Excellence in Community Impact and Excellence in Professional Services.

The award categories were expanded for



2024, following feedback from entrants in the inaugural awards. Some categories now break down into small or medium/large businesses.

The categories are: Primary industries, technology and innovation, environmental sustainability, export, customer experience, and workplace culture.

There are other awards for excellence in emerging new business, community impact, emerging business leader, business leadership, manufacturing, retail and hospitality, and tourism.

Mr McGrath said the business awards endeavoured to celebrate excellence and give high achieving businesses in the Ashburton District a pat on the back for their creativity and passion.

The draft strategy is all about our natural environment and has been developed with the help of local groups and landowners. It aims to protect and enhance the district's flora and fauna for the next generation.

The document suggests an action plan and outlines what is already happening in the natural environment, which is under pressure from land use changes, and a changing climate.

At the farmers' market on Saturday will be Council's ecologist and biodiversity advisor, who is happy to chat with people about the importance of the strategy.
