# Our second urban bridge now a key Govt transport project

Last Thursday was definitely a red-letter day for me as far as the battle for a second urban bridge over the Ashburton River is concerned.

Government announced that a bridge to be built off Chalmers Avenue would be among 14 key road transport projects in the next three years. The fact that National has also said it will build a second bridge there means that whoever is in power after the General Election in October will be building a

And that should be music to the ears of everyone who lives in the Ashburton district and those who pass through it on a regular basis to do business up and down the South Island.

I was asked if that was like winning the lottery – but this bridge has not happened by chance. It has involved years of community consultation, official hearings to designate land for both the bridge and connecting road on the Tinwald side, and countless hours and energy around Council table debating location, location and

Both Labour and National have now committed to building it off Chalmers Avenue, which has repeatedly emerged



as the preferred location, and it will be at no cost to ratepayers in the district. That was a little funding icing on the cake as the bridge had been in our longterm plans and we were about to begin discussing how to pay for it.

The \$113 million estimated cost is for the bridge and new road that will run south to Grahams Road. Council has already purchased most of the properties needed, and the project and location has the support of Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency, which is also

It will be able to be built off-line, without major disruption, and when connected to our local roading network it will

a second crossing for vehicles, cyclists and pedestrians. It will better connect Tinwald to Ashburton and provide the resilience we know we need, given flooding in the Ashburton River has caused the existing State Highway 1 bridge to be closed twice in the past two years.

Those closures cause disruption up and down the South Island as people and freight have no way across, so I am not the only mayor delighted that the second bridge was on the draft Government Policy Statement for land transport last week. The bridge has wider support from all the mayors in Canterbury, and I appreciate their

What next? The draft policy statement is open now for consultation and everyone in New Zealand can have their say. As a Council, we will be making a submission on behalf of the whole district, supporting the inclusion of the second bridge as a key project - you too can make a submission, and it is as easy as going to our home page and clicking the link.

You can then complete a quick online survey to give your feedback, and ultimately help our district be safer and more resilient.

## Happy 50th Birthday Mt Hutt Skifield!

Ashburton people are being urged to head to the hills at least once over the next four days as the town of Methven helps Mt Hutt Skifield celebrate its 50th birthday.

The party kicks off tonight with entertainment in Methven from 5pm, with a tractor parade at 7pm and a lantern parade at 7.30pm. The official opening haere mai happens at 7.45pm and then Kiwi rock band Dragon will play from 8pm.

Deputy mayor Liz McMillan will be in the crowd joining the celebrations. She came to live in Methvenn in 1994 to manage Ski Express and was based in the Mt Hutt office for four seasons.

"I instantly felt at home in Methven and have always loved the connection between the mountain and the town. While I don't get up to ski as much as I would like nowadays, it's still my happy

She said Mt Hutt skifield has had such a huge, positive impact on Methven and on the Ashburton District in general and so it was great to be part of the birthday fun.

"NZ Ski has invested not only in the skifield, but in Methven, and our town has grown into a multi-cultural, happy tourist spot that has in turn encouraged all sorts of visitors to check out this spectacular part of New Zealand.

"Happy birthday Mt Hutt, I say, and many more."

Friday's celebrations include the Mad

Hutters Tea Party, to be held at the Methven Rugby Club from 5.30pm, where there is an open invitation to the community and all Mt Hutt Alumni to share their stories.

Saturday features the White Out music festival and the mountain will be open on Sunday for moonlight skiing.

Council is lending entertainment support by providing an inflatable ice rink, that will be free to the public on Thursday night, then open for business from 1pm-6pm on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Curling is available on Friday and Sunday nights, and the rink will host a family disco on Saturday night.

"This is one way the Council is supporting Methven and the Mt Hutt celebrations, and hopefully our temporary ice rink will encourage more people to give the real thing a try at Staveley."

Some roads around Methven are temporarily closed for the opening night parades, so please follow traffic management signs if you head up, and dress warmly.

### Old rural halls ready for removal

The disused Lynnford and Maronan community halls are being offered for purchase and removal from Council reserve land.

Both halls are at least 100 years old and were once the hub of their communities – acting as places for education and recreation - but have been used little in the past decade or so.

The Maronan hall was officially closed in 2017 and the Maronan Reserve Board's administrative functions transferred to the Hinds Reserve Board. Lynnford hall followed suit in 2019.

Both are single-storey wooden buildings, with a corrugated iron roof.

Council and the Hinds Reserve Board are jointly inviting expressions of interest from parties for the purchase and removal of one or both buildings.

Democracy and Engagement Group Manager Toni Durham said parties interested in tendering for the buildings could arrange to look through the halls or find out more information by getting in touch with Council.

"It's sad that these old halls are no longer used but over the years it's been increasingly difficult to find enough money to do the major upgrading work required and so they have fallen into disrepair.

"Bringing the land under the Hinds Reserve Board has helped the situation,



but restoring the halls to the standards required for public use is not simply feasible. There may be people out there who would like to give them a new lease on life."

Tenders to remove the buildings must be made by 29 September.

The Maronan hall on Swamp Road was originally the Maronan School, built in 1921. By the end of 1922, it had a roll of 39 students but it only operated as a school for 15 years before consolidating with Hinds School.

The hall at Maronan then became the district's social hub, hosting meetings, balls, dances, euchre events and the like. It has not been used for any purpose like

this since about 2010.

Lynnford hall, on the corner of Lynnford and Boundary Roads, has a similar story. The building was built for a school in 1895 at Huntingdon and relocated to Lynnford in 1912.

The school closed in 1949, and its students went to Eiffelton, Willowby and Hinds Schools; the building became the community's hall and was used by several different clubs and for meetings and dances and other social gatherings.

When the Education Board did not require them for education purposes any longer, the land became recreation reserves and the buildings managed by community boards

About 7000 dogs live in the district and in the first month of registration in July, 5590 were registered by their owners.

Our data also revealed the most popular dog breeds, with Labradors coming out on top. The next most popular breeds were Huntaway, Border Collie, Jack Russell Terrier, Heading dog, Staffordshire bull terrier, Bichon Frise, Shih Tzu, Fox Terrier and Golden Retriever.
